

Feuerbach Blasts 70-9

WALNUT (Calif.) — (AP) — Al Feuerbach, inchng closer to Randy Matson's 6-year-old world record, unleashed history's third longest shot put — 70 feet, 9 inches — yesterday at the Mt. San Antonio Relays.

The 250 pound Iowan displayed one of the strongest performances ever with the 16-pound iron ball and said he had a potential to heave it 73 feet.

His 70-9 came on his fifth throw of the overcast, chilly afternoon. It was only 8½ inches short of Matson's 71-5¼ record. Matson's 71-4¼ ranks No. 2 in the world.

The 6-foot-1, 25-year-old

Pacific Coast Club member, erased Matson's 1968 meet record of 69-10¼. He also avenged his first defeat after eight straight victories by beating teammate George Woods, who won the event Friday at the Drake Relays, 69-0½ to Feuerbach's 68-5.

Performances in other events were generally disappointing, but Feuerbach,

who lives in San Jose, said he knew this was his day during his warmup throws.

"I had a no-foul warmup of 71-11 — by far my best throw of my life. I had another warmup better than the record but it wasn't measured."

He fouled on the first of his six tosses and estimated that it soared 70-9 to 70-11.

"After my foul, I just tried

to get one in there. My second went 69-9½ and that, when it became obvious to me that I could have broken the record. I'm sorry I didn't do it, but I'm still happy."

His third put went 69-9 and his fourth, 69-6½. Then he threw 70-9 before finishing at 68-10½.

Woods, the Olympic silver medalist last summer when Feuerbach finished fifth, was second with a best effort of 67-9.

"I know the potential is there for a phenomenal throw," Feuerbach said. "The potential is there for a 73-foot throw."

53-7 Triple Jump Top Drake Relays Feature

DES MOINES (Iowa) — (AP) — Triple jumper Barry McClure, Middle Tennessee, and the Kansas and Kansas State baton teams smashed records in yesterday's concluding session of the 64th Drake Relays.

McClure, NCAA indoor champion, soared 53-7 in the triple jump, topping the former record by half a foot.

Kansas, anchored by Gregg Vandaveer, sped to an impressive 56.1 victory in the university-college 480-yard shuttle hurdles relay, shaving six-tenths of a second from the Drake mark, and the Kansas State 440-yard relay team won the university division in 39.8,

clipping two-tenths of a second off the meet mark.

Marks Equalled

Two Drake records were equaled as a crowd of 18,000 watched at Drake Stadium.

Olympic champion Rod Milburn, Southern University, easily retained his 120-yard high hurdles title with a 13.5 victory. That matched Milburn's own meet record, which was tied in the Friday preliminaries by Scottie Jones, Texas A&M, runnerup in the finals with 13.8.

Another Drake mark was matched by Alcorn A&M in capturing the college 440-yard relay in 39.9 Missouri scored a mile upset by

capturing the university distance medley as favored Manhattan College finished third. Missouri's mile anchorman, Charles McMullen, with a 4:04.7 clocking, finished strong to overtake Manhattan's Mike Keogh, who also faded to place behind Eastern Michigan's Gordon Minty.

Slow Race

Missouri's winning time was a comparatively slow 9:41.8.

In the triple jump, defending champion Al Lanier, Cincinnati, placed second to McClure with a leap of 53.4, also bettering the Druge record of 52-11 set by Nebraska's Lennox Burger in 1968.

Villanova 'Triples' In Penn Carnival

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Villanova wiped out Bowling Green's unprecedented effort to win the four mile relay at two major meets in two days, and won the two mile event to record a triple at the 79th annual Penn Relays yesterday at Franklin Field.

A Villanova quartet of Emmon Coghlan, Brian McElroy, Ken Schappert and John Hartnett, none of them bonafide milers, won by some 120 yards over a listless Bowling Green unit in the four mile. The winning Wildcats were clocked in 16:31.7, four seconds off the meet record.

Bowling Green, winner at Drake the night before, was never in contention and finished a distant second in 16:45.9.
