

STEVE WILLIAMS Wins going away

Sick', He Runs 100 yds In 9.1

Examiner Sports Writer FRESNO - Nineteen year-old Steve Williams felt sick, didn't like the track and said he was running out of spite because he hadn't been invited to the Martin Luther King Games in Phil-

adelphia. But, after it was all over. Williams admitted he was happy to have entered the 100-yard dash in last night's

All he did was equal the world, American and Relays mark with a brilliant, legal 9.1 clocking.

"I felt sick. I have a slight cold and I had a bad start in the finals" Williams said. "I gave Herb Washington a

full step at the start." It ldidn't do Washington much good, 20 vards from the finish line. Williams exploded from a tightly

> The near capacity crowd at Ratcliffe Stadium didn't have to be told that Williams had run a dazzler. When he crossed the finish line, he was two yards ahead of Don Quarrie of ASC, who finished at 9.3, same time re-

> corded by Washington. Williams thus joins a select field which includes Bob Haves, who set the mark at

the National AAU, meet in 1963. It's been equalled by four others, including John Carlos of San Jose State, at the 1969 West Coast Relays.

"I didn't like the track." said Williams, "I felt I could run better on a composition surface. I should have run as fast last year, but ! pulled a muscle just before

the Olympic Trials." Last year Williams ran for University of Texas at El

Paso, but he left after coach Wayne Vandenburg was, fired. A native of New York City, he now attends San Diego state and is competing for San Diego Track

Club. Williams mark was the only world record set on a hot night, livened at times by gusty winds. In fact, it looked as if the wind might affect the 100-yard final only

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
