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Williams Gets Revenge, Share of World Record

Steve Williams had a few scores to settle Friday at UCLA and it took him less than 10 seconds to get the

The 20-year-old New Yorker, a three-time loser at 100 yards this season, won the 100 meters, equaling the world record of 9.9 seconds In the 86th National AAU track and field championships.

The two-day meet, sponsored by The Times, concludes today with 13 final events, plus the Marathon of The Times starting at 8 a.m. The hammer throw starts at 1 p.m. The pole vault and javelin start at 3 p.m.

Williams, 6-3, 180-pound San Diego State sophomore, equaled the record first set by Jimmy Hines, Char-

Don Quarrie of Jamaica and the
Beverly Hills Striders was a fastclosing second in 10.0 and Tennessee freshman Reggie Jones, the NCAA

champion, was third, also in 10.0.

Ivory Crockett, the first man to run 100 yards in 9 seconds flat, faded badly in the final drive and wound up seventh.

The wind was only 2.9 m.p.h., well below the allowable of 4.473.

Other winners on a warm, clear afternoon before 7,000 fans included

hurdles; world record holder Dwight John Powell, 214-11 in the discus.

Ex-Oregon star Bouncy Moore

came from behind on his last attempt to win the long jump at 26-51/4 and former Villanova runner Dick Buerkle was a surprise winner in the 5,000 meters in 13:33.4.

The marks by Powell and Buerkle were meet records while Foster equaled the record in the high hurd-

Buerkle burst into prominence last winter when he upset Steve Prefontaine early in the indoor season but hadn't been heard from since because of an injury.

He was a comfortable winner over Olympic marathon champion Frank Shorter, second in 13:34.5. Marty Liquori, moving up from the 1,500 meters, finished fifth and favored Dick Quax of New Zealand was a struggling sixth.

In the 100, Williams got off to a good start although he staggered slightly a few yards out. At 40 yards, it was anybody's race with all nine runners forming an almost perfect line across the track.

Williams, running smoothly, gradually took command and at 80 yards it appeared he would be an easy


winner. Quarrie, however, suddenly made a move and he was closing fast as the runners hit the finish.

Williams looked across at Quarrie as he hit the tape, then raised his arm in a signal of victory as he jogged in the north turn of the track. There, he turned around, looked over the vanquished field behind him and went into a little victory dance.


"Yes," he said, "I'm looking forward to meeting Valeriy Borzov. I hear he's in shape, so it should be interesting. I've started slow this year because of injuries but now I'm just reaching my peak."

Williams will meet Borzov in the USA-USSR meet, July 5-6 at Dur-ham, N.C. Last year, in the meet at



Kiev, Borzov declined the is sue in the sprints, scratching from both dashes, and was soundly beaten by Williams on the anchor leg of the 400-meter relay.

Today, Williams may face a tougher assignment as he again confronts Quarrie at 200 meters. Quarrie is the co-world record holder at 19.8.

"I'm not going to pick a winner," said 440 world record holder John Smith, "but I think the time will be under 20 seconds. be under 20 seconds. That's the best I've ever seen Williams look in the 100. He looks more like a Tommie Smith every day. I'd say he's a cross be-tween Tommie Smith and John Carlos."

Quarrie, the ex-Trojan, will be an angry runner today. He was assigned lane No. 8 in the 100, just next to the outside, and said he didn't know where he was in the race until it was too late. Wil-

liams was in lane No. 5. "I don't know why they assigned me that lane," said Quarrie. "It was the same at the Modesto Relays when I ran third behind Steve and Ivory Crockett. At the Kennedy Games, I was right next to Steve where I could pull on him.

"I'm not saying I would have won today but I might have pushed Steve to a world record of 9.8. For sure, I'm going to be all out in the 200 tomorrow.

After losing to Crockett at Modesto and Quarrie at the Kennedy Games, Williams was beaten by Jones in the NCAA at Austin.

All three races were at 100 yards, about 10 yards short of the Olympic dis-tance of 100 meters. The added distance played into the strength of Williams, a fast finisher, and proved the undoing of Crockett who usually is coming back to the field as the race progresses.

The first two finishers in the AAU qualify for the U.S. team that will meet the Soviets. Quarrie, a foreigner, will be excluded and Jones will be the No. 2 man behind Williams.
