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College Park, Md. Jan. 11-The CYO National Invitational Meet kicked-off the indoor season with some top-notch performances.

Dick Buerkle blasted a meet record 8:26.2 two-mile to defeat Steve Prefontaine and earn the Outstanding Performer award. Taking the lead at the mile mark (4:16.0), Buerkle raced the last 880 in 1:59.8, leaving Pre sixty yards behind in 8:33.0. "I did 8:33 last week in Syracuse and so I know I was in pretty good shape. I didn't know what shape he (Pre) was in, but past that first mile I motioned for him to take the lead, and he didn't, and so I knew he was hurting," revealed Buerkle.

"He ran a smart race," stated Prefontaine. "Next time I'll be ready for him."

Rod Milburn added another world record to his list of accomplishments, taking the 60 yard highs in a record tying 6.8. LSU's fine pair of hurdlers, Larry Shipp and Allen Misher ran second and third in 6.9 and 7.1.

In the 880, Byron Dyce and Mark Winzenreid waged a hard fought battle. Dyce, representing the Florida Track Club, prevailed in a swift 1:49.4. Winzenreid was .4 back in 1:49.8.

Canadian Bruce Simpson cleared 17'4" on his final attempt to capture the pole vault. Simpson was not close in three tries at a meet record 17'9". Second place went to Casey Carrigan who vaulted 17' 0" on his first try. Swede Kjell Isaakson managed 16'6" for third.

World record holder Herb Washington sped 60 yards in 6.0 defeating San Diego State's Steve Williams, 6.1, and last year's winner Hasely Crawford, 6.2.

Competition in the shot was superb as Al Feuerbach outmuscled teammate George Woods 68'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " to 68'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Jesse Stuart from Western Kentucky, fouled three times, but managed a 66'9" heave for third. Internationalist Ron Semkiw was fourth with 65'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

For the third straight year American record holder Reynaldo Brown was victorious in the high jump. Leaping 7'2", he defeated outdoor recordman Dwight Stones, and Gene White who both cleared 7' even.

In the mile, Marty Licuori held off Len Wilton 4:01.2 to 4:02.1. Last year's victor, Olympian Bob Wheeler, dropped out with about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  laps to go. Apparently reinjuring himself, Wheeler pulled off his left shoe revealing a heavily taped arch.

Maurice Peoples lost a chance to win the 500 yard run

when he attempted to pass Dennis Schultz on the inside with a half lap to go. He couldn't squeeze by, and the tactical error left Peoples .2 behind Schultz's winning 56.6. Stan Vinson of Eastern Michigan and Fred Sowerby of Sports International tied for third in 56.9.

Clocking 1:09.6, Jim Bolding was victorious in the 600 over Florida's Beaufort Brown, 1:10.0, and Pete Schuder, 1:12.0.

# Liquori Captures Mile; Prefontaine Is Beaten

COLLEGE PARK, Md., Jan. 11—Marty Liquori, who has not run an indoor mile race under 4 minutes, started off with every intention of doing so tonight. But halfway through his first indoor mile of the winter, the former Villanova star decided to settle for just a victory.

Following a slow pace, Liquori took the lead after a half mile and won the Knights of Columbus invitation mile of the seventh annual Catholic Youth Organization meet at the University of Maryland's Cole field

Monroe and Phil Jackson—while Seattle came in with John Hummer and Fred Brown. That was a pretty good indication of relative squad strengths.

For the next eight minutes, Things stayed fairly competitive. The Knicks opened the period with an 11-4 burst, but were leading only 41-36 with 4:30 to do when the dam burst. By now the original unit was back except for Jackson in DeBusschere's place, and it produced a 12-point run that brought the score to 53-36. The half ended with the Knicks ahead 57-40.

house. He was clocked in 4 minutes 1.2 seconds before 11,097 fans.

Len Hilton, the national A.A.U. outdoor mile champion, set the pace for the first half. Then, with a 2:02.6 time at that distance, Liquori took command.

The biggest surprise of the meet came when Dick Buerkle of the New York A.C. beat Steve Prefontaine, of Oregon, in the two-mile run, and he did it by a wide margin.

Buerkle, a former Villanova star, who was the runner-up in the 1973 national three-mile to Prefontaine, won in 8:26.2. This was the second best American indoor two-mile clocking. Prefontaine's 8:24.6 set last year is the American indoor mark.

Prefontaine, the National Collegiate three-mile and cross-country champion, tried but could not match Buerkle's late speed. He finished about 60 yards back.

Four young women running for the Atomi Club of Brooklyn established a world indoor one-mile relay record at 3:41. This took 3½ seconds off their own world mark set last year. The four runners were Michele McMillan, Cheryl Toussaint, Lorna Forde and Brenda Nichols. Miss Nichols's anchor time was 56.6 seconds.

The absence of Ben Jipcho of Kenya and Johannes Mohammed of Ethiopia may have kept the race from being a sub four-minute event.

Liquori said, "About half way through the race I switched my plan from running under 4 minutes to winning the race. I think Jipcho and the Ethiopian would have helped. There was just no natural pace-setter out there and there would have been with them in the race."

Jipcho had been advertised as an entry for the meet and for the Knights of Columbus

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meet in the Nassau Coliseum tomorrow night. But there was a mix-up about airline tickets involving the Amateur Athletic Union and Kenyan officials.

Jipcho is in Christ Church, New Zealand, preparing for the British Commonwealth Games that start late next week.

Byron Dyce, a former New York University runner from Jamaica, was also hoping to compete in those commonwealth games. In fact, he recently took part in two development indoor meets in New York in preparation for the meet in New Zealand.

This training helped Dyce tonight. He ran his fastest indoor half mile and won the event. Dyce beat Mark Winzenreid in 1:49.4. However, it didn't help Dyce because Jamaica athletic officials decided not to send him with the team to New Zealand.

"It sounds all political to me," Dyce said. "But I'm

pleased. This was my best indoors here."

Bruce Simpson of Canada won the pole vault at 17 feet 4 inches, the best indoor performance by a Canadian.

Rod Milburn, who hopes to sign as a professional with the International Track Association before its first meet next month, gave his attorney some good bargaining points. He tied the world best of 6.8 seconds in the 60-yard high hurdles. This was the second time in a month that Milburn has equaled the mark that Hayes Jones set and Earl McCullough and Willie Davenport had equaled.

Milburn beat Larry Shipp of Louisiana State by a tenth of a second. Allen Misher, also of L.S.U., finished third.

Milburn said, "My lawyer is working on signing me with the I.T.A. I haven't heard from him but I hope to be a pro for their first meet." That first meet is scheduled Feb. 15 at the Nassau Coliseum, Uniondale, L. I.
