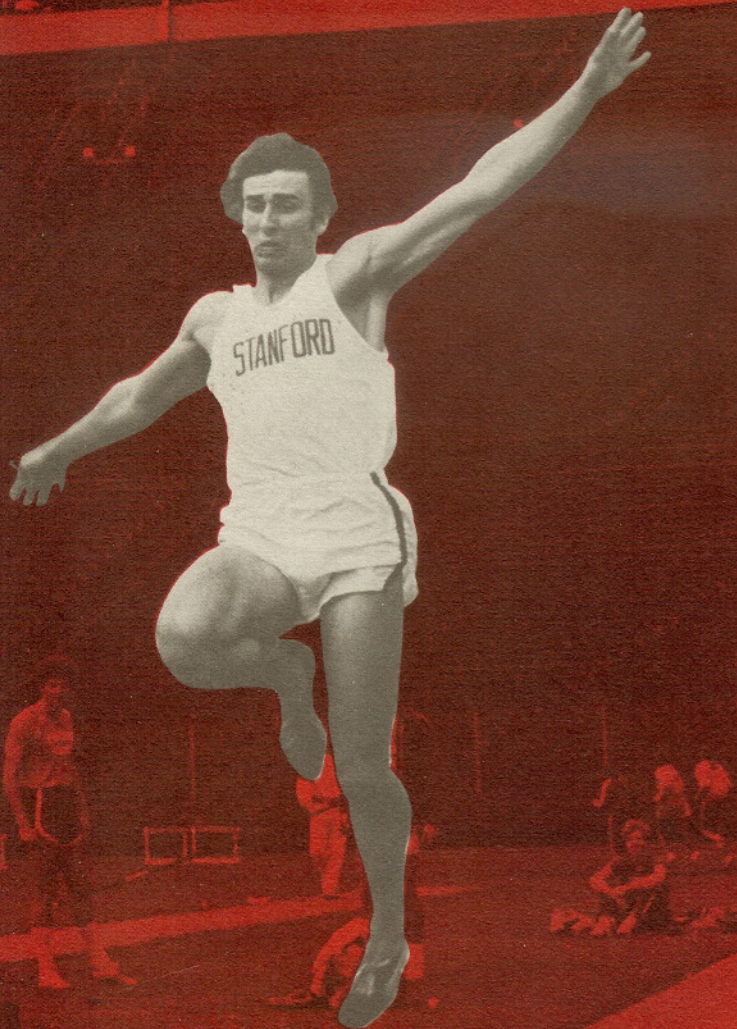
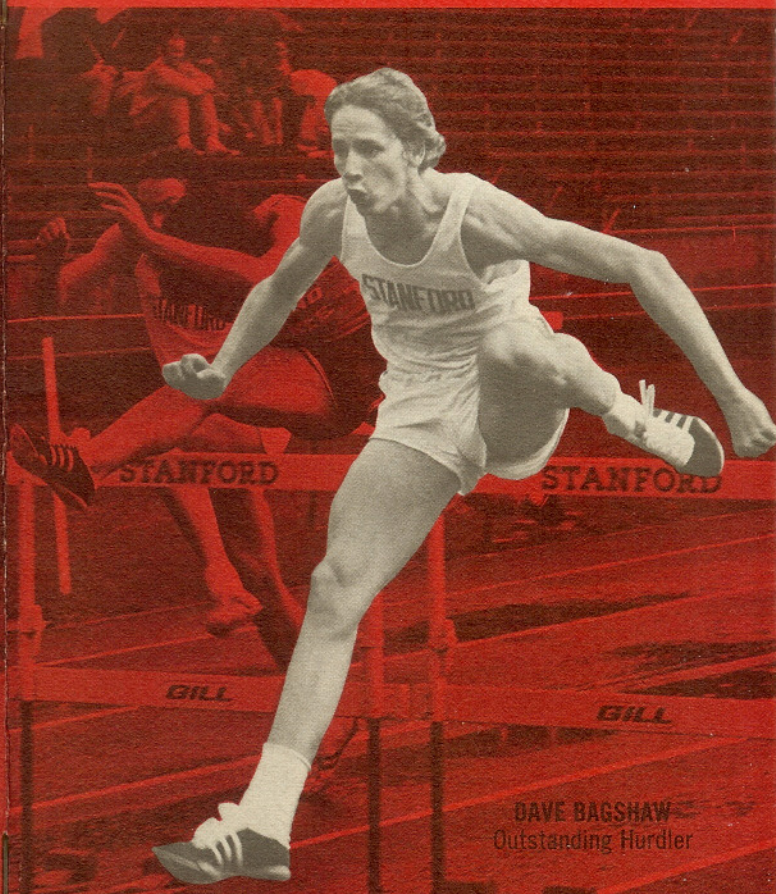

## 1974 STANFORD TRACK & FIELD OUTLOOK

Coach Payton Jordan's 1974 edition of Stanford Track & Field will not enter the season with a great deal of press clippings or ballyhoo! Last year's team finished 2-4 in dual meets and looking up at the other seven schools in the Pac-8 conference meet at the University of Oregon May 18 and 19. Gone from that squad are ace miler Brian Mittelstaedt (4:00.1), reliable jumpers Tom Anderson (25-2¼) and Ron Utley (50-2) and solid performer John Anderson (47.9). Even more painful than the losses by graduation, were the decisions by shot putter Terry Albritton (Stanford record at 61-6½) and discus thrower Jim Howard (174-2) to sit out the 1974 campaign in the interest of pointing toward even better things at Stanford in coming seasons.

The "newcomers" list is impressive in places, but the "losses" far outweigh the "arrivals" where point winning performances are concerned. If Coach Payton Jordan ever needed a challenge, the 1974 Stanford Track & Field season is it! Payton, who won two consecutive senior 60-yard sprints in winter indoor meets in blistering times of 7.1 and 6.9, has never backed down from competition, and he's determined, as always, to get the best out of his athletes this time around. "We're going to be out-manned by most of the teams we meet, especially in the Pacific-8," states Jordan. "But, this is a cohesive group, and they aren't afraid of hard work. We don't have a lot of flashy marks to point to, but we think that this team can prove a lot before the season is over. There are some events where we will have trouble scoring at all, but our kids refuse to be disheartened. We'll learn a lot of lessons this year. . . many of them will help us toward improving our performance this year, but particularly in track. If a football team is ever rated in the country's top ten that is considered a supreme achievement. In track, as has happened many times in past years, we can have one of the "top ten" dual meet teams in the country, but hardly anyone notices because most of the power, strength and speed is right here in our own conference. I'll never forget 1963 when we could do no better than second in the Pacific-8, but finished 2nd in the NCAA Championships, too!"

What strength the Cards do show in 1974 will appear mostly on the track, rather than in the field events. From the sprints through the distances, the Jordan crew will be competitive, but it is in the hurdles, where Dave Bagshaw excels, that most of the highlights promise to appear. Bagshaw, a junior who's father is a professor of radiology on The Farm, has that certain "class" track fans like to talk about. His bests of 14.0 in the highs and 52.6 in the intermediates are modest by Pac-8 standards, but both should drop early in the '74 campaign. His deepest talent is in the long hurdle race, where his long-striding style should bring him close to Randy White's all-time Stanford record of 50.7. With all this, Dave Bagshaw may be hard pressed to head off his own teammate, Matt Hogsett (53.0), a class 440 IH man who has already established himself as one of Stanford's most talented intermediate hurdlers. Matt, also, is a top 440 man and relay runner.

Kenny Curl, a veteran point-winner in both sprints will aim toward improving his '73 bests of 9.4 and 21.0, while still hoping to discover that little extra explosiveness which could make him a "world-class" performer.

Senior John Kessel heads up a group of more than adequate quarter-milers, and the prospects in both that race and the mile relay should be improved over a year ago. If any event features "super stars" in the Pac-8 it has to be the 880, since it takes better than 1:49.0 even to be listed among the top performers. The Cards won't have that, but veterans Vernell Jackson and Ben Scheible should collect some points while aiming toward times of 1:52.0 or better.

The loss of Mittelstaedt in the mile throws the pressure to little Tony Sandoval and rapidly improving Mark McConnell, both of them better at longer distances. Either could come up with a 4:10 mile, but the Pac-8 had at least a dozen better than that a year ago. Both Sandoval and McConnell should run comfortably under 9:00 anytime they choose in the 2-mile, so it will often be a year or two away from his potential. Jack Bellah will join McConnell in the 2 or 3-mile and also run the steeplechase, but he might be a year or two away from his potential.

The losses of Albritton and Howard in the shot put and discus, respectively, have caused tremendous voids in these two events, and Stanford fans can only look forward to 1975 when both will be back. Jim Royer promises 170-0 and better in the discus, but points in the shot put will be harder to find.

Steve Hopkins should improve beyond 230-0 in the javelin, but the Pacific-8 had at least six over 240-0!

Kenny Kring will long jump beyond 23-0 and junior Mike Hall has the potential to match him. But, the high jump finds only senior Bob Laney with a life best of 6-4½. Triple jumpers Hall and Derek Toliver are both more than 2-feet short of the 50-0 performance level, but have shown marked improvement in early conditioning. Kring, one of the nation's top decathletes, will also excel in the pole vault, promising to aim at 16-0 in the coming season. In the ten-event spectacular, he finished 9th in the NCAA Championships and 2nd in the Pac-8 a year ago and is currently working toward improvement in every event.

In summary, this year's Stanford team cannot realistically be rated as a strong contender in the Pacific-8, but it must be remembered that this conference includes at least three of the most powerful teams ever assembled in the history of intercollegiate athletics. It is because of this that the Stanford Stadium spotlight will shine on the April 20th competition involving the Stanford vs. UCLA and California vs. USC double dual competition which will actually be a preview of the NCAA Championship.

In the words of Coach Payton Jordan, "We know our limitations, but that doesn't affect our enthusiasm or our expectations. We are looking forward to a great season of competition, and most people who know us know, also, that Stanford teams usually come up with a few surprises."

OUTLOOK: Veteran Kenny Curl heads up a more than representative crew of sprinters with frosh football ace Marvin Holmes and J.C. transfer Otto Rossner the other top candidates. Curl showed great improvement last season, but still might be just a little short of his full potential. Captain John Anderson, a point-winner in the 220 in '73, is gone, but Holmes and Rossner should more than take up the slack. The sprints should be stronger for the Cards in '74, but, as usual, the Pac-8 is loaded with world class runners.

440 YARD RELAY TEAM: Curl, Holmes and Rossner will be joined by either Scott Wingo, Manuel Gonzales (10.0) or Matt Hogsett, giving Stanford the promise of a swift sprint relay team. This event should be "much improved" over a year ago, as the Cards should have a better than even chance to start off with a 5-0 margin in most meets.

OUTLOOK: There is little doubt that this will be the "most improved" event for the Cards this year, especially from the standpoint of depth. Wingo and Hogsett have both been registering swift times in early season workouts, and, when Hogsett concentrates on the flat race, he has the potential to lead the pack. Wingo is a talented frosh and should be a point-winner wherever he is placed, from the 100 to the 440.

MILE RELAY: For the first time in several seasons Coach Payton Jordan should be able to put a talented mile relay quartet on the track without "stealing" from other events. No less than four runners were being clocked under 49.0 in the early season, and the coaches hope that most of them can drop below 48.0 with more conditioning. With a little luck and good health, any four man combination from this group could shoot at the all-time Stanford mark of 3:10.5. Bruce Henry will be eligible in the spring quarter.

OUTLOOK: For the past two years Brian Mittelstaedt has "dropped down" into this event to give the Cards a chance for points when badly needed. With Mittelstaedt gone, the pressure will swing to Jackson and Scheible both capable runners. Freshman Crowley might just have the most potential here, but virtually every other team in the Pac-8 will be running a "super star" in this race.

OUTLOOK: With Mittelstaedt and Les McFadden now departed, the Cards are also looking for help in this event. Sandoval should run under 4:10, but he is also needed badly in the 2-mile. Crowley comes along with great high school credentials, but he must come of age in a hurry. McConnell has talent here, too, but like Sandoval, the longer the distance the better his chance. The consensus is that the Stanford depth here will be more than adequate, but the lack of an outstanding runner will most certainly be felt. Freshmen Jeff Parietti (4:13) and Dave Allen (4:15) both placed in their high school state meets in '73.

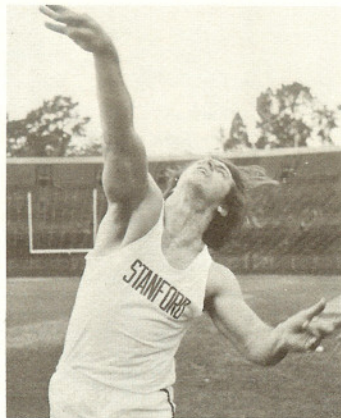

## 1974 STANFORD TRACK AND FIELD COACHING STAFF

PAYTON JORDAN  
Head Coach (18th Year)

The extremely successful coach of the 1968 United States record-breaking Olympic track and field team, Payton Jordan has been a tireless worker in developing champions in this country for more than 30 years.

Jordan molded the U.S. contingent into a cohesive unit which won more medals and broke more records than any other team in history. But, Payton's accomplishments prior to his selection as Olympic coach are, perhaps, even more impressive.

During the summer of 1967 the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics elected the former all-time great sprinter to its Hall of Fame for his coaching efforts at Occidental College. In his ten years at Oxy (1946-56) Jordan produced ten league championships, two NAIJA titles and a 4th place finish in the NCAA finals. The path that took him to head coach at Occidental, and later to Stanford, began at the University of Southern California, where he was a three-sport star. Even before enrolling at SC, Payton had clocked times of 9.6 in the 100 and 21.1 in the 220 at Santa Monica Junior College. During the next two years on the Trojan campus, he captained the track squad, played rugby and started at halfback on a strong Trojan football team. After graduation, he ran the 100 in 9.5 to set a world record for grass tracks and later ran an unofficial 9.3 on a dirt track. In the service, he was an All-American halfback while competing for the Iowa Naval Air Station.

After his brilliant ten years at Occidental, Jordan moved to Stanford in 1957. In his 17 years on "The Farm" he has steadily built up the track and field program in the face of increasing academic pressures and rising admission standards. Competing in the Pacific-8, the toughest athletic conference in the country, Stanford has consistently held its own, a particular highlight being a 2nd place finish in the 1963 NCAA championships. The Cards always seem to produce a number of "world class" athletes, the most recent of which have been high jumper Peter Boyce, discus throwers Dave Weill and Bob Stoecker, sprinter Larry Questad and miler Ernie Cunliffe. Boyce, Weill, Questad and Cunliffe were all Olympians.

Jordan also has extensive experience on the international level. Five summers ago, he helped prepare the Yugoslavian National team for the European Championships in which it earned its first individual Gold Medal. A decade earlier, he helped the Greek Team prepare for the Olympics. During the 1964 Olympic Games, Payton was first assistant coach. He also assisted the U.S. team in the Maccabiah Games in 1965, the U.S. World Games team four years ago and coached the U.S. Deaf Games team in 1965 before being named head coach of the U.S. 1968 Olympic team.

Payton is remembered by many as the organizer and motivating force behind the fabulous United States vs. USSR competition in Stanford Stadium in 1962, often referred to as the most outstanding track and field event ever held in Northern California. The two day event attracted more than 150,000 spectators and added up to the most inspiring and emotional athletic meeting outside of an Olympic Games.

Elected President of the National Collegiate Track Coaches Association in 1958, Payton has been a vice president of the International Association since 1966. He has also worked on the U.S. Olympic Committee since 1961 and on the NCAA Rules and AAU track and field committees for four years each. A founder of the Southern California Striders, the 55-year-old Jordan virtually introduced indoor track and field competition to the San Francisco Bay Area.

Payton is the author of several articles and two books on Track and Field, including "Champions in the Making" which he co-authored with Stanford assistant track coach Bud Spencer in 1968. The likeable Jordan picked the 1972 winter indoor season for his competitive "comeback," winning a pair of 60-yard dashes in the excellent "senior" time of 7.1. At the San Diego Indoor Meet on February 19, The Coach made it a "triple slam," winning again over a classy field in the World Record Senior time of 7.0. Payton went one better in January and February of 1974, sprinting to victory in the San Francisco Cow Palace and then realizing a two-year ambition of stopping the clocks in 6.9 in another winning effort in San Diego.

In the summer of 1972, he was suitably honored by being named to the United Savings-Helms Hall of Fame in Los Angeles for his many years of achievement and contribution to athletics.

### MARSHALL L. CLARK

Assistant Coach  
Head Cross Country Coach (6th Year)

The highly successful coach of Stanford's Cross Country Team for the past six years, Marshall Clark brings unmatched enthusiasm and dedication into the Track and Field program as an assistant to Coach Payton Jordan.

Clark met with almost instant success in his first year as Head Cross Country Coach in 1968, guiding the Cards through an undefeated season and into a 2nd place finish in the NCAA Championships behind Villanova. That year, Marshall turned out the first two Stanford Cross Country All-Americans since 1964, Brook Thomas and Greg Brock. Brock repeated the honor in 1969 and Don Kardong followed as another All-American in 1970. To earn his recognition, Kardong was a 3rd place finisher in both the NCAA and AAU Championships in the winter of 1970-71.

In 1969 and 1970, Coach Clark's Cross Country Team finished third in the Pac-8 Championships. Just like Jordan, Marshall is a graduate of the University of Southern California, where he received a B.S. degree in 1957 and a Masters in 1958. The lanky Cardinal Coach lettered on the Trojan Track and Cross Country Teams of 1955, '56, and '57 and was a member of the 1955 NCAA championship squad. Marshall competed three years for the Southern California Striders, excelling in both the 440 and 880.

Clark spent his next ten years coaching Track and Cross Country at Los Altos High School in La Puente and at Monterey's Seaside High School. He headed the Los Altos track programs for nine years, before moving to Seaside in 1967. His cross country teams had an overall record of 79-18, while his track squads compiled a 56-31-1 mark. Marshall piloted six league championship cross country teams during that span, winning one CIF Southern Section Title, and three league championships in track.

In February, 1972 Marshall was accorded the honor of leading a contingent of United States athletes to Moscow for a three day International competition. With twelve nations represented, American Tommy White, under Clark's direction, skipped over the 60 meter high hurdles in the world record time of 7.4.

Clark is married and the father of 3 children.



### BUD SPENCER

Assistant Track and Field Coach

Bud Spencer, one of the greatest runners ever to attend Stanford, works with the Card sprinters, burdlers and quarter milers. En route to the 1928 Olympic Games, Bud shattered a 12-year old world record for

400 meters and then went on to win the NCAA 440 yard championship. His swift leg on the 1600 meter relay team helped bring the United States a Gold Medal, and he later anchored a record-breaking mile relay quartet in the U.S. vs. British Empire Games. Spencer is the co-author of "Champions in the Making" with Head Coach Payton Jordan.

Bud also has his own personal Assistant Coach, the ever alert "Pooba", who also serves as the inspirational team mascot!



### VERN GAMBETTA

Assistant Track and Field Coach

Vern Gambetta, formerly an outstanding athlete at Fresno State, was a welcome addition to the Stanford coaching staff last fall. While pursuing a Masters Degree in Education on The Farm, Vern, not only

tutors the Stanford athletes, but he also finds time for his own conditioning program toward decathlon competition in the late spring and summer.

A most versatile assistant, he concentrates on the jumps and the weight program and works closely with fellow decathlete Kenny Kring in his 10-event sessions.

According to Head Coach Payton Jordan, "Vern is a most unselfish individual and an outstanding young coach. He has been of great assistance to Marshall and me, and his participation has made it possible for each of us to concentrate in more detail with each of our competitors."

### STANFORD STADIUM

All of Stanford's home track and field meets are held on the campus in historic Stanford Stadium, one of the largest and finest arenas of its kind in the country. The Stadium was built in 1921 with a seating capacity of 60,000 which, through subsequent additions, has now been raised to almost 90,000.

Stanford Stadium is the home of Stanford football in the fall, but it is internationally known as a track and field facility. In the fall of 1970 a rubber based "Medalist" running surface was installed on the 440 yard oval, and "Tartan" surfaces were installed for all field event runways and takeoff areas. The discus and shot put rings are cement circles. These improvements have brought Stanford Stadium into the "all-weather" category where track and field facilities are concerned, and, according to Coach Payton Jordan, "We have not missed a day of practice due to weather since our new surfaces were installed." In the recent past, Stanford track meets have had to be moved to the all-weather facilities of either Foothill College or San Jose State. This will not be the case for any future meets scheduled for Stanford Stadium.

Since its construction, the Stadium has been the site of several national and international meets, among the most recent the 1960 United States Olympic Trials and the 1962 Dual Meet between the Soviet Union and the United States. These two events broke all previous standards in the United States for attendance, caliber of competition, color and drama.

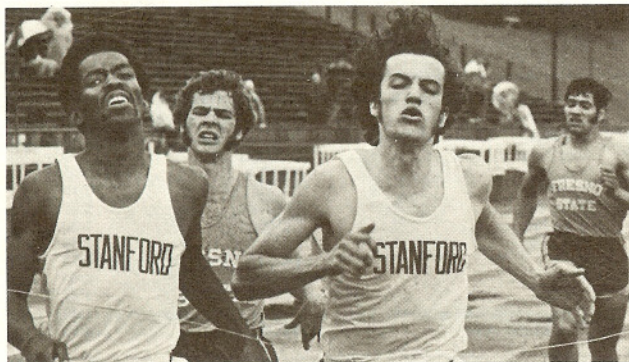

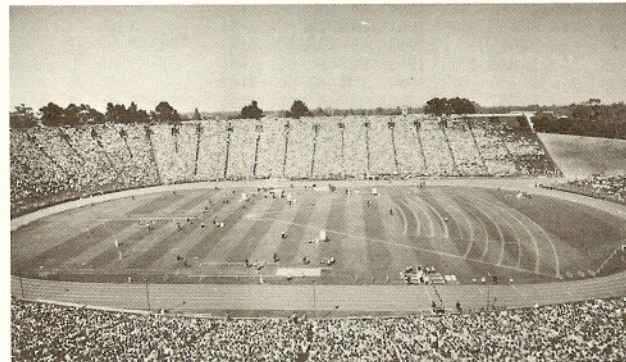

## STANFORD TRACK AND FIELD HISTORY IN BRIEF

Stanford track and field athletes have been breaking countless world, national, regional, and event standards for nearly three-quarters of a century. Many participants have been members of Uncle Sam's Olympic Games squads and a number have won Gold, Silver, or Bronze medals. From a team standpoint, the Cards have won national, conference, and relay titles. The school's record over the years is one of the finest in the country.

The Stanford track and field history can roughly be broken into three great eras - The "Dink" Templeton Regime of 1918 and 1921-1939, The Jack Weiershauser Regime of 1946-56, and The Payton Jordan Regime of 1957 to the present.

The late Robert Lyman (Dink) Templeton was one of the greatest coaches the sport has known. His record speaks for itself. His teams won the then blue ribbon ICAAAA Meet four times, the NCAA thrice, and turned in a dozen world record performances.

Although Templeton's star pupils were legion, the name of Ben Eastman stands out above them all. Under Dink's guidance, Ben revolutionized middle distance running in the short space of two weeks. The world mark in the 440-yard dash of 47.4 had been set in 1916, and it was fairly generally accepted that this mark was quite safe. And it was, for 16 years, until March 26, 1932. That day at Angell Field, Eastman travelled the first 220 in 21.3 (faster than the flat 220 was run in the meet that afternoon) and broke the tape nearly 20 yards in front of the second-place man in the time of 46.4, a full second ahead of the old mark.

But Ben wasn't through rewriting the record books. Two weeks later, on April 9, he set out to break the half-mile mark of 1:51.6, set by the great German runner, Dr. Otto Peltzer in 1926. Lack of experience in the longer race caused him to run his first lap too slowly, but the second was a masterpiece and Ben broke the tape in 1:51.3.

Templeton always had great weight men. Never to be forgotten was the tremendous 1-2 punch of Harlow Rother and the late Eric Krenz, 1928-30. The former set a world record of 52-1 5/8 in the shot put and the latter did likewise in the discus, 167-5 3/8, and each was close behind the other in his specialty. John Lyman was the first man in the world to put the shot 54 feet (54-1) in 1934.

The pole vaulters were headed by Bill Miller, 1932 Olympic Champion at 14-1 7/8, and Bud Deacon who cleared 14-2 3/4 in the University Championships in 1934. There were plenty of fine sprinters including Clyde Jeffrey, who held the school record, 9.4, for 24 years. The high jumpers, of course, were headed by 1928 Champion Bob King (6-6 5/8).

Another of Dink's prize pupils was "Iron Man" Jack Weiershauser, a star in the sprints, 440- and 220-yard low hurdles. He teamed with Jim Kneubuhl, Ray Malott, and Stan Hiserman (former coach at the University of Washington) to set a new world record in the 880-yard relay.

Later as head coach himself, Weiershauser - the "Iron Man" of the Dink Templeton era - coached two of the greatest all-around track and field athletes ever: Bob Mathias, 1948 and 1952 Olympic Decathlon Champion and former world record holder, and Gay Bryan.

Mathias' efforts in the Olympic games are well known. In dual meets, he often entered five events, winning three and placing second or third in the other two. He still holds the All-Time Stanford record in the 110-meter hurdles at 13.8.

Bryan, on April 29, 1950, had the greatest afternoon ever turned in by a Stanford athlete in a dual track and field meet. Against UCLA, Gay entered and won five events: the 100 (10 flat), high jump (6-4 3/8), high hurdles (14.7), 220 (21.9), and long jump (23-1 1/2). In the Big Meet of May 7, 1949, he won four events: the 100 (9.8), high jump (6-4), 220 (21.1), and low hurdles (23.8), and placed second in the long jump by an inch.

The Weiershauser era also saw some of the greatest javelin throwers in Stanford history, including Bud Held, John Bugge, Bob Kimball, Leo Long, Kirk Nieland, Chuck Harlow Jr., Chuck Coker and Hank Roldan.

The Payton Jordan era is highlighted elsewhere in the book.

It is impossible, of course, to list all of the outstanding athletes who have competed in track and field at Stanford in such a short space. Many more names can be found in the records below.

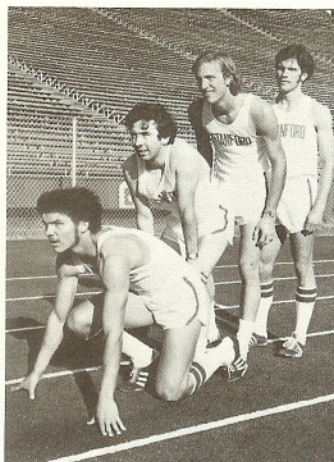

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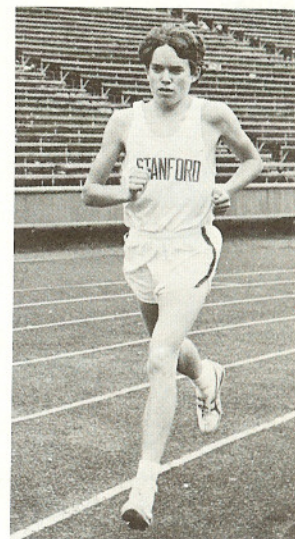

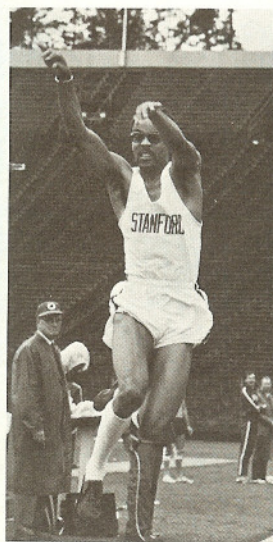
