STOCKHOLM AP - Fil-

berti Bayi of Tanzania led all the way to win the mile race comfortably in an international two-day track and field meet Monday.

The 21-year-old Bayi did not set out in his usual fast pace early in the race and clocked 3:54.1, three seconds off American Jim Ryun's seven-year-old world mark.

Bayi, who said he had trouble with his breathing in the dry air at the end of the race, will enter the 1,500 meters Tuesday. He holds the world record for that distance in 3:32.2, set during the Commonwealth Games in Christchurch, New Zealand, earlier this year.

Ulf Hogberg of Sweden surged past Australia's Graham Crouch in the finish for second place with a Nordic record of 3:54.5. The Aussie was timed in 3:55.6 and bettered his personal best by four-tenths of a second.

Pakka Vasala, the Finnish 1,500 meters Olympic champ, came in fourth in 3:57.1 for a national mark in his comeback.

Byron Dyce of Jamaica finished fifth in 3:37.3 followed by former AAU-champion Len Hilton of the United States, 3:37.6, and John Kipkurgat of Kenya seventh in 4:05.7.

John Ngenu of Kenya edged Olympic marathon champion Frank Shorter of the United States in a razor-thin finish over the 10,000 meters. Both clocked 28:11.0 in the photo finish.

Jos Hermens of Belgium was third, in 28:21.0 followed by Richard Yuma of Kenya, 28:22.0; Karel Lismont, Belgium, 28:23.4, and Akio Usami, Japan, 28:37.6.

Hannu Siitonen of Finland tossed the javelin 276 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inch to win ahead of world record holder Klaus Wolf-ermann of West Germany, who reached 275-9 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Julius Sang of Kenya won the 400 meters in 46.4.

Raeline Boyle of Australia took the women's 100 dash in 11.5 seconds.
