I feel like I've made a come back. I was sick earlier in the year (mononucleosis). Winning in international competition is a big thrill and is very satisfying. International competition gets you some attention...my goal now is to make the seniors team next year. I took the lead over the first hurdle and felt I could win if I didn't make any mistakes.

Pavel El'Terman

I wasn't entirely happy with my race...I hit the eighth hurdle. The Americans are fine hurdlers but I believe they can be beaten.

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Clancy Edwards, 100 meters winner

I was really nervous before the race. The man I was worried about was my teammate (Houston McTear). I wasn't sure I had won it until they called us to the winner's stand. He beat me off the blocks and I got even with him at about the 80 yard line. The atmosphere of this type meet really gets you up...it's great fun.

Alexander Zherdev

My main speciality is the 200, so I'm not that disappointed. In fact this is my best effort ever (time-wise).

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SIDELIGHT: The women's 100meter winner, Ludmilla Ushatik, lost her gold medal shortly after the presentation ceremony, but wasn't aware it had fallen from her sweat clothes. She was sitting in the stands, when a fan found it and returned it to her.

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Ekaturina Smirnova, USSR Pentathlon 17-year-old

(asked about the American male athletes, because a number of them had been impressed by her good looks): No, I haven't actually met any of them, I have seen a lot of them. I don't care for their hairstyles at all. (Told about the US male interest, she blushed, obviously pleased, and said nothing.) The Soviet coach cut short the interview very politely, saying he would rather the USSR Athletes not be interviewed until after they finish their competition (the pentathlon continues).

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Tom Byers, USA 1,500 meter winner

It was great...a real thrill. Last week (finishing second in the AAU) was the biggest thrill of my career, but I guess this tops it. The Russians did all the work, setting a good fast early pace. After the first two laps, the momentum was easy to keep. My coach had drilled into me all week the importance of not letting them (Russians) psyche me out. Still, I was scared to death before the race, but I felt great, my legs felt light, and I think I could have run faster. I'm excited already about next week (senior AAU meet).

SIDELIGHT: Tom Byers, Sr., and the Ohio State track coach flew in today to watch him run.

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Rosetta Birt, US anchor of winning 4 X 110 yard relay

I had mixed emotions about coming here at first because I wasn't going to get to graduate with my (high school) classmates) or go on the senior trip, but winning the relay makes everything okay. This is my senior trip.... We had our handoffs down well. We had had trouble with them for the last few days, but we just got everything together.

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AZARI GERCHIKOV, USSR Head of Delegation

There have been some marks tonight which would be the envy of many senior performers. (Asked about overall showing: I am pleased with some athletes' results and disappointed in others. I will have to wait until tomorrow night for a full evaluation.)

OLEG KONSTANTINOV, Head Track Coach of the USSR

The organization of the meet has been outstanding. We are very pleased. There are some of the results which we have not been pleased with, and some we are pleased with. We were <sup>not</sup> pleased <sup>with</sup> the showing of our pole vaulters. They performed better than we had expected them to.
