Trojans swamp Cal for L.A. sweep in double-dual meet

The good folks from KTLA-Channel 5 in Los Angeles taped yesterday's double-dual at Stanford for delayed showing in Smog City. what they got was a somewhat pedestrian rehearsal for the May 4 USC-UCLA dual meet.

With UCLA Coach Jim Bush holding back a number of his best people so they will be healthy and fresh for May 4, the Bruns were good enough to win over Stanford. 99-46, but not nearly as good as they can be.

And USC, while using

most of their best athletes, simply did not compete well. as strange as that may sound in view of the fact that they beat Cal. 931/2-511/2.

"I don't understand it." Bush said, "USC is a good team and yet they competed so badly here. You can be sure they won't be off form when they meet us."

What the crowd of 10,500 and the TV audience did see were solid performances by Cal and Stanford athletes and a subtle display of social comment as the Cardinals' black athletes wore black armbands in order. they said, to protest the San Francisco Police Department's stop-and-search procedure.

Cal gained a moral victory of sorts by winning six of the day's running events, including a school record 13.8 clocking for McKinley Mosley in the 120 high hurdles.

Mosley got off to a slow start and had to make up a yard on USC's Ed Washington on the way to the tape. It was a photo finish with Washington given the same time, but Mosley got the win and Lou Kirtman's 12year-old Cal record of 14.0.

"It is encouraging for later in the season," Mosley said. "Just about now you start looking ahead to the league meet and you want to show some improvement. Still, the race didn't seem that fast. I just seemed to drift over. I thought it might be 14.2 or something."

Earlier, Mosley had run a leg on Cal's upset win in the 440 relay, runing with Wesley Walker, Howard Strickland and Sammy Burns. The Bears' precision handoffs (credit to assistant coach Eddie Hart) made the win in 40:4 look easy as they beat the Trojans by two-tenths.

For the first time this year, Burns didn't have to follow his sprint relay duties by running in the 100-yard dash. And the extra rest paid off for Sammy as he reduced his lifetime best in the 220 by four-tenths, to 21.0, beating USC's Mike Shavers and Ken Randle.

"After the race, Shavers

(an old rival from Albany High) came over to tell me that he'd never lose to me again," said Burns, "but he can keep talking all he wants to. The only times I've ever lost to him were when I was hurt. And I'm getting stronger and stronger from running the quarter-mile."

The USC-Cal half-mile went exactly as expected, with James Baxter of the Trojans leading through the first lap in 54.2, then Cal's Rick Brown picking him off on the final turn to post an easy win, in 1:49.4. Baxter finished in 1:50.3.

Stanford got career-bests from miler Steve Crowley and three-miler Tony Sandoval to account for its two victories. Crowley made a last-lap rally to pass UCLA's Mark Luevano and win in 4:10.5. But the Bruins' sub-4:05 milers, Curtis Beck and Gordon Innes, sat out vesterday's meet.

The strategy Sandoval used was somewhat different. He led almost the entire distance in the combined four-team race and was 15 seconds ahead of the field at the finish with his 13:45.4 clocking. It was the fourthfastest time ever for a Stanford runner, behind Don Kardong, Arvid Kretz and Greg Brock.

Only double winner in the meet was UCLA sprinter Dotson Wilson, a teammate of Shavers at Albany High who went to Westwood without a scholarship. Wilson took the 100 in 9.9 (against a brisk wind) and the 220 in 21.5.
