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# Reggie Jones Beats McTear

MODESTO—Houston McTear forgot his shoes and Steve Williams forgot to come, so Reggie Jones stepped up Saturday night to win the 100yard dash over a faltering McTear in the 34th California Relays.

Jones, the NCAA champion from Tennessee, was clocked in 9.3, threetenths behind the world record of 9.0 which McTear equaled two weeks ago in the Florida high school championships.

McTear, who led most of the way, was clocked in 9.4 as he just held off Jamaica's Don Quarrie for second.

Meet director Tom Moore could not explain the absence of Williams, who defeated McTear last week in the Martin Luther King Games at Kingston, Jamaica.

"I talked to him earlier in the week and he assured me he would be here," Moore said.

McTear, running in borrowed shoes, was off to a great start but at the 75-yard mark he started to waver

Jones stands 6-3 to McTear's 5-7, and it was like a big hound running down the rabbit. "I just lost," said McTear, 18-year-old junior at Baker High in Florida. He was unsmiling and obviously disgrun-

tled.

Asked what he planned to do against Williams and Jones in the National AAU championships, McTear said, "Bring my own shoes." The Modesto track, a sandy-clay surface, once was rated one of the fastest in the world but apparently it has lost some of its bounce. The times weren't slow but no longer do you have the feeling that world records are seriously in danger.

in danger. One who found the track to his liking was Wilson Waigwa of Kenya, who ran a lifetime best of 3:55.6 in winning the mile. Following the pace of NCAA champion Paul Cummings, Waigwa tore off a 55.9 final lap to win in a runaway. Cummings, of Brigham Young, faded badly and wound up seventh in 4:02.9. Other top marks included 7-5 by Dwight Stones in the high jump, 219-3 by Finland's Pentii Kahma in the discus, 27-21/4 by Arnie Robinson in the long jump, and 20.3 by Quarrie in the 220. USC came from far back to win the 440 relay in a meet record 39.3 and got a big lift in the pole vault when so-phomore Russ Rogers upset the field with a lifetime best of  $17-7\frac{1}{2}$ .

of 17-742. Kahma defeated world record-holder John Powell, who finished second at 216-11. Kahma, 31, 6-2 and 243, broke his Finnish record of 218-3 set last year when he was rat-ed No. 1 in the world. Now just how good is Houston McTear?

Now just how good is Houston McTear? Well, you obviously can't call him the world's fastest human but you could call him the man to beat. "All he needs is experience," said UCLA's Benny Brown, winner of the 440. "When he gets it, he's going to be dyn-amite. He'll be No. 1 next year." Track Notes

Track Notes Stones took three tries at a world record 7-7 but didn't come close. His winning height was the best outdoor mark in the world this year . . . Rogers, who had a previous best of 17-11/2, said he wasn't thrilled by his 17-71/2. "I won't be satisfied until I'm No. 1," he said.
