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fastest, yet he has to train on his own.

"If the United States was serious about the 1976 Olympic Games, they would have somebody coachy Steve right now.

"He has some rough spots to iron out. He's running with tight hands and coming out of the blocks high. He reminds me of Tommie (Smith)."

While Williams was doing his thing, Haynes, who competes for the Army, was scoring an impressive double — winning the long jump at 26-4 (his first jump of the competition) and the triple jump at 54-8¼.

In his second triumph, Haynes caught SJS standout Ronnie Livers, whose 53-11 effort on his first attempt led until the first round of the finals.

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Livers, the 19-year-old sophomore, was forced to miss the end of his competition after two jumps in the finals with a minor back injury.

"It's just a spasm and I should be ready for Fresno (West Coast Relays) next week," said a disappointed Livers.

"I felt real good, but things like this happen. If I can't jump at Fresno, I'll definitely be ready for the confer-

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ence (Pacific Coast Athletic Association) meet in two weeks."

Haynes' showing barely nudged Powell for field athlete of the meet honors.

Powell, a San Jose policeman, won his heated discus duel with Mac Wilkins, 218-7 to 211-2.

Al Feuerbach, competing with a painful wrist, won the shot put in an unimpressive (for him) 65-4½.

But Al, who set the world record of 71-7 here two years ago, wasn't blaming the wrist, which he hurt with excessive weight training, on his showing.

"Hey, I'm not upset," smiled Feuerbach. "It's my worst put in three years. I estimate that's 120 competitions. But it doesn't mean anything. I won.

"Things start getting important in late June and I expect to be at 70 feet then.

"Actually, I'm after that 72-6½ world record," laughed Feuerbach, referring to Brian Oldfield's unrecognized indoor mark.

Perhaps the biggest shocker of the day occurred in the women's 800 meters as Francie Larrieu, considered America's top female distance runner, finished a poor third to Kathy Weston of the Wills Spikettes and Cindy Poor of the San Jose Cinder-

gals.

# Williams runs 20.2w furlongs

SAN JOSE—Steve Williams came to the San Jose National Bicentennial track and field meet with two goals—to run the 100 in 9.1 and the 220 in 20.2. He accomplished the latter yesterday.

"The cold bothered my 100 time," said Williams, who won the event in 9.2, with a 4.75 trailing wind. "Then there were a lot of technical things I did wrong, like my hands were too tight at the finish and my head was wobbling. When the race began (Ronald) Whitaker got off to a good start and my eye caught him and it broke my concentration. I didn't get it back until about 70 yards out. That's where I caught him.

"I know that once I correct those technical problems I'll be all right. Physi-

cally there is not a person in the world who can beat me. I'm striving for perfection and I'm certain I can reach it."

In the 100, Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo's Clancy Edwards was second in 9.3, barely nipping San Jose State's Whitaker, who posted the same time.

The 220 was another matter. Williams, who had a trailing wind of 6.7 m.p.h., blasted through the turn and had the race clinched down the straightaway.

"The wind nearly pushed me out of my lane in the 220," continued Williams, now attending San Diego State. "But what hurt me was that I didn't have anyone near me at the finish. I'm certain that if I could have seen someone, I could have gone two or three tenths quicker."

Second place in the furlong went to Edwards in 20.4, with Whitaker third in the same time. For his sprint double, Williams was named the track athlete of the meet.

"I'm pleased to a degree with my performance," continued Williams. "This was only my second 100 and first 220 of the year. I know I can do better and I'm certainly far from overjoyed. I guess when a person is elated totally with an effort, he's had it. I mean where else can you go from there?"

The top field honors went to Tommie Haynes of the U.S. Army. Haynes won the long jump (26-4) and the triple jump (54-8¼).

Both marks were season bests for Haynes. His previous best this year in the long jump were 25-11 and 54-8 in the triple jump.

# No world records in SJS 'records' meet

"It was supposed to be a go for broke meet," sighed Bud Winter. "We told the guys to be loose and run for records but . . ."

But the weatherman didn't co-operate at San Jose State's Bud Winter Field Saturday and there were no world records and only a few stadium marks in the eighth San Jose National Invitational.

Still, there were some top performances. Steve Williams, who Winter calls "potentially the best sprinter in the world," set

the near-capacity gathering on its ear by running a typical twin win of 9.2 and a wind-aided 20.2.

Williams was supposed to be challenged by San Jose's sensational sophomore Ron Whitaker, but Clancy Edwards of Cal Poly took a distant second in both dashes.

Williams' 220 would have been a stadium standard, if not for a slight aiding wind of 4.75 miles, while Whitaker, despite finishing third in both sprints, clocked lifetime bests of 9.3 and 20.4.

Whitaker could have finished second in the 220,

but loped to the finish when Williams blazed by him in the backstretch.

"Once I saw that bleeper go by me it didn't seem to make much difference," Whitaker said. "That bleeper (Williams) is really bad. I can see I need some speed work."

Williams was not pleased by his performance, which earned "track athlete of the meet" honors.

After winning the 100, the long-legged San Diego State student declared, "The time was slow, man. It wasn't warm enough for me to get going. I could have run 9.1 or better if it wasn't so cold."

Winter, the former San Jose State coach reckoned for his schooling of sprinters, congratulated Williams after his double win and gave him a few tips.

"He could be the best in the world but he's got some rough parts," Winter imparted. "He comes out of the blocks too high, like Tommie (Smith) used to, and he's too tense. Did you see his hands? They were clinched like a fighter's. They should be hanging loose, relaxed."

"Everybody needs a coach," Winter noted. "You can't watch yourself in any sport. If we were really serious about the Olympics we'd have somebody watching a guy like him. He's potentially the best in the world, but he needs polish. Where's the AAU with all its money? The Soviets work with their guys for years."

Tommie Haynes of the Army was selected "field athlete of the meet" after scoring a sizzling double, winning the long jump in 26-4 and taking the triple jump in 54-8½.

San Jose's Ron Livers didn't compete in the high jump, which he could have won, and finished second in the triple with a leap of 53-11 before bowing out with a sore leg.

John Powell of the Pacific Coast Club, who set a world record of 226-8 the next day in Long Beach, won the discus with an impressive throw of 218-7 against the wind. Jim Penrose of Belmont finished fifth with 182-2.

Francie Laurrieu said she was going for a U.S. record in the women's 880, but instead she finished third as Kathy Weston won in meet record-equalling time of 2:08.9. Loretta Simmons of the Redwood City Flyers was fourth in a lifetime best 2:14.6.

Other stadium records included Bill Clark 29:03.4 six-mile, Tom Dooley's 14:13.8 2-mile walk and a batch of age-group marks, the most notable an American record 12-13 girls 440 of 56.0 by Marquita Belk of the San Jose Cindergals.
