DRAKE STADIUM: NOW IN 11th SEASON AS BRUINS' T&F HOME

UCLA'S BEAUTIFUL on-campus track and field facility, Drake Stadium—some experts have called it one of the world's finest—is in its 11th season as the home of the Bruins' T&F teams.

Since its inaugural meet on Feb. 22, 1969, the Stadium has been the site of many championship meets—National AAU in 1976-77-78, Pacific-8 Conference in 1970 and '77 and California CIF in 1969-71-77—as well as the Bruins' exciting dual meets, especially the USC-UCLA crosstown classic.

An annual Stadium fixture is the California State Special Olympics for Handicapped Children. It will be held again this summer, June 22-23-24.

The Stadium also has been the home for UCLA Women's track teams since 1975. It was the site of the National Collegiate T&F Championships (the AIAW) in 1977.

It also is used each year for special campus events, such as the annual UCLA Commencement Exercises in June.

In 1973, it was officially named Drake Stadium in honor of a living legend at UCLA, Elvin C. "Ducky" Drake, who now has been associated with his alma mater as a student-athlete, track coach and athletic trainer for 56 years.

The nine-lane track is surfaced with Tartan, an all-weather synthetic. (Note: It was resurfaced with same Tartan material last summer.) The quarter-mile track—and it's a fast one—meets all NCAA regulations and surrounds an infield with complete facilities for field events. In the north part of the track is a slot for a water pit for the steeplechase.

Other facilities include a working press box located on the concourse level atop the Stadium.

The Stadium provides seating for some 12,000 spectators. Aluminum contour benches assure comfortable seating—and every seat provides perfect viewing.

BRUIN MILE RELAYS HAVE ECLIPSED 3:10.0 FOR 13 STRAIGHT YEARS

UCLA again fielded a fine mile relay team that zipped under 3:10.0, a feat accomplished in each of the last 13 years under Coach Jim Bush. Last year's combo clocked 3:06.5 for 1600 meters, equal to about a 3:07.6 mile relay time.

UCLA's four-lap relay heritage includes remarkable strings of six NCAA crowns in a row and seven overall in 1966-69-70-71-72-73-74 and nine conference titles in 1966-68-69-70-71-72-73-74-77.

BRUINS HAVE CLAIMED 5 DUAL TITLES IN 9 YEARS OF RANKINGS

UCLA finished fourth, their lowest rating ever in *Track & Field News'* dual meet rankings, since the competition began in 1970. Compiled by T&FN correspondent John Wenos, the rankings measure each team by schedule toughness, depth of performances, head-to-head competition and hypothetical competition.

UCLA, though, has been named the nation's best dualers in five of the nine years that rankings have been compiled, one ahead of USC, who have won the other four times.

THE 1979 BRUINS

BY ALL ACCOUNTS, UCLA's track and field Bruins had a good year in 1978. Ranked fourth in the nation among dual meet teams. A very close third in the Pacific-8 title meet and with a little luck, UCLA could well have been champion. Second in the NCAA title meet. With three individual champions in the shot put, high hurdles and pole vault, the Bruins came ever so close to "winning it all," but had the misfortune to lose their final chance for points when the mile relay was disqualified in its semi and did not advance, though finishing in a qualifying second position in that race.

So it ought to be tough to duplicate a season like that—especially with the loss of three great tri-captains in world pole vault record man Mike Tully, high hurdler James Owens, who scored points in each of his four NCAA title meet tries and triple jumper Willie Banks, who was second in the NCAA meet in each of the past two years. But, UCLA coach Jim Bush says "I feel that we'll be stronger on the dual meet level than in 1978 when we get into the Spring Quarter—and Marcus Gordien becomes eligible.

"We'll be stronger in the field events than we were last year in duals and I think this team will be equally strong in the NCAA meet—maybe even better than last year. We will again be a contender for the national championship in 1979."

That's good news for Bruin track enthusiasts. The individual strengths of this UCLA squad will become more apparent in the event-by-event rundown that follows with Coach Bush: (Lifetime bests for listed athletes follow in parentheses.)

THE SPRINTS AND 400-METER RELAY: "We have a very fine freshman here—maybe the best freshman ever to enter UCLA in the sprints," grins Bush. He's speaking of **ERIC BROWN** (9.4y, 10.2, 21.0y) from Bethel HS in Hampton, Va. Brown was rated as the best 220 man in the nation last year by *Track & Field News* and was an impressive winner in the Virginia State championships. Naturally, the Bruins' top dashman in 1978, the phenomenal **GREG FOSTER** (10.33, 20.40) is available if needed. Just a junior, he's shown great sprint ability in his first two seasons at UCLA, especially in the 200, where he had the number four time among collegians last year, despite only running the event occasionally.

"These are two of the finest sprinters anywhere," says Bush. "They'll rank right with almost any school we will face. They make this sprint group the best here since the Warren Edmonson days."

UCLA also has the services of **LAWRENCE WILLIAMS** (10.5, 21.4) back and he was the sixth place finisher in the conference last year, really coming on at the end.

Bush says succinctly: "We're in pretty good shape in the 200." Pretty good indeed, with Foster, Brown, Williams, **LEW MCGLOTHIN** (20.6) and **DONN THOMPSON** (21.3) all available for duty if needed, as is freshman **MILTON WEAVER** (21.2y).

The Bruin mentor is equally optimistic about the sprint relay—an event that has been exceptionally strong for UCLA in the past three years. "This could be our best group

ever," comments Bush. "We have three men back who have experience on our relay and we have added Brown!" Cause to celebrate indeed as the Bruins ran the second-fastest collegiate time of the year behind Southern Cal in 1978 at 39.25. Back from that squad are third-man Donn Thompson and anchor Greg Foster. Lawrence Williams and Lew McGlothlin both ran on the team that finished second to the Trojans in the conference at 39.75. Adding Brown gives UCLA not only additional speed, but great depth. **JOE PARKER** will also be slated for some short relay duty this season.

THE 400 METERS AND MILE RELAY: The event, traditionally strong at UCLA, really has Bush excited for '79: "We could be stronger here than we have been in years, since the Benny Brown/Maxie Parks days. We have one proven 400-meter man in **DONN THOMPSON** (45.65) and we have added **JOE PARKER** (47.2y). I think both will be in the 45s this year and our "surprise" of '79 could be **LEW MCGLOTHLIN** (47.7y), who is going to shock a lot of people and could be in the 45s as well.

"Our goal is to have all three of those men in the 45s and I believe they can do it if they can all stay healthy."

The four-lap relay has been one of the Bruins' top events for more than a dozen years, and 1979 should be no exception. UCLA has lots of people available—Thompson, Parker, McGlothlin, **GREG FOSTER**, **RUSSELL HIGGINS**, **CONRAD SUHR**, **BRIAN THERIOT**, **ERIC McNEAL** and **ERIC BROWN**. Foster had track buffs drooling with excitement at the NCAA meet last year with his easy 46.5 anchor in his heat.

"We've got more talent to draw on than we have had in recent years," Bush explains. "That's why we should be able to beat last year's marks. We were deprived of our NCAA title shot last year by the disqualification, but we can run as fast as anyone in the US this season . . . if we have our top four together and they're healthy."

THE MIDDLE DISTANCES (800/1500/Mile): Though a variety of men are available, the two-lap race will be in the hands of basically three men. Fastest ever at UCLA, **CONRAD SUHR** (1:46.8) lowered his school record twice last season. "He has the potential to bring it down one more second before he leaves," says Bush, "if he has no injuries."

"He can also score some points for us in the NCAA meet," Bush adds. Freshmen **DAVID BROWN** (1:52.6y) and **BENNIE BROWN** (1:56.4y) also figure in the picture. "David obviously has fine potential. Bennie has fine potential as well, even though he didn't run very fast in high school," Bush comments. **BRIAN RUSSELL** (1:52.5y), **BRIAN THERIOT** (1:50.4) and possibly **STEVE BECK** (1:51.9) all add depth.

Bush contends his metric mile corps will be better than ever . . . maybe. "We could be as strong here as anytime in the last ten years—but only if we stay healthy. **BRIAN RUSSELL** (3:44.7) has great potential and wants to do well. He's hun-

gry for a good year and has all the tools to be outstanding." Bush also feels good about a young freshman from Florida, **MICHAEL LAWRENCE** (4:16.8y), who might surprise during his initial collegiate season.

BRIAN THERIOT (3:51.1) moves to the 1500 full-time this year and has the potential to help the Bruins here as well, as could another freshman, **ALEX GONZALES** (4:25.0y). The status of **STEVE BECK** (3:45.8), who's been down with nagging injuries since 1976, is unclear.

THE 5000 METERS AND STEEPLECHASE: This is possibly UCLA's thinnest event. "We have **VICKEN SIMONIAN** (13:54.8) in the 5k, but he was hurt at the end of the cross country season and had an operation on his knee and remains questionable for us," Bush explains. However, the Bruin boss is confident that if **GLENN BEST** (14:48.0) can run to his potential, he'll be quite good. Help should also be coming from last year's best, **JOE DOWLING** (14:44.4), along with veterans **PAUL FRENCH** (15:28.6), **DAVID GREIFINGER** (15:01.9), plus newcomers **ASHTON COOPER** (14:57.8) and **RAY AVER** (14:58.8).

Bush moans, "We have no proven steepler. None of our returnees have broken nine minutes." Best among the veterans is **ROGER WATKIN** (9:07.8), the only Bruin under 9:10. Improvement is looked for from **RICHARD HORNISH** (9:28.9), and **PAUL FRENCH** (9:59.0).

THE HURDLES: UCLA has an ace here. "We have the top HHer in the world, I feel," claims Bush, "because he had the top time in the world last year and was unbeaten while he was healthy." Bush refers, of course, to **GREG FOSTER** (13.22) who annexed the American record, formerly held by Rod Milburn, at the NCAA championships in recording his first NCAA win as a sophomore. He's backed up by JUCO transfer **RUSSELL HIGGINS** (14.43), who Bush says "has potential to be under 14 seconds, but has a long way to go." It's the first time UCLA hasn't had a pair of world-class hurdlers in five seasons, before James Owens teamed with Clim Jackson.

The one-lap barrier race is manned by the surprise of 1978, **ERIC McNEAL** (50.9). In addition, Bush feels Higgins (51.8), with his 13-strides pattern between hurdles, may be under 50-flat. Foster, a national-record holding low hurdler in high school, has hinted that he might try this event in 1979. Bush's comment? "He'd be a natural for the event."

THE VERTICAL JUMPS (High Jump/Pole Vault): "We have the returning Pac-8 champ in the HJ, and he did a great job last year," Bush refers, of course to **DWAYNE JOSEPH** (7-2), who went over seven feet for the first time since his prep days in a big way last year, jumping a sensational 16" over his head. The Bruin depth consists of a pair of 6-10 performers, **PHIL ISAAC** and **JEFF LEACH**.

After having all three injured in the Fall, Bush is hopeful his pole vaulting trio will stay healthy enough to give him the best depth in the United States. "**CHARLIE BROWN** (17-6)

should be among the best collegians this year. He's got 18-foot potential without a doubt. **ANTHONY CURRAN** (17-4¼) is very good and can be an 18-footer as a freshman this year." Curran, however, broke some bones in his ankle and had to have surgery during the winter break, putting him in a cast for 6 weeks, so he'll be significantly behind schedule when he returns. **JON WARNER** (17-0) has also had ankle trouble, but Bush says "he has potential to be way up in the 17s this year for us." With improvement, this trio could be the best ever at UCLA, besting a fine threesome of then-freshman Mike Tully (17-10), Ron Mooers (17-8½) and Anthony's brother, Tim Curran (16-9).

THE HORIZONTAL JUMPS (Long Jump/Triple Jump):

Youth is on the accent here, where Bruin hopes are focused on sophomore **CHIP BENSON** (24-6¼, 51-5) and frosh **DOKIE WILLIAMS** (25-1¼, 51-2½). "Dokie has fantastic potential, but he'll have to improve to really help us," says Bush.

Bruin gridders **SCOTT STAUCH** (25-4) and **PHIL HUBBARD** (24-5w) are looked to for help in the LJ, while **DWAYNE JOSEPH** (23-4, 51-2) will primarily assist in the TJ, after his fourth-place conference effort last year.

The big loss in this area, of course, was Willie Banks, who rewrote all the UCLA TJ records and had sensational bests of 25-11½ (LJ) and 55-11¼.

THE WEIGHTS (Shot Put/Discus Throw/Javelin Throw):

"We've got the NCAA champ in the shot and he should be even better with Marcus backing him up in the Spring Quarter," Bush says. The NCAA king is **DAVE LAUT** (66-1¼), who came through with a great year after transferring from junior college as Cal State JUCO champ. When he becomes eligible, **MARCUS GORDIEN** (62-1½ indoors) will be a big help, as his big PR in the Ali Invitational indoors this year shows. "We could have the best 1-2 punch among collegiate shot-putters," Bush comments.

In the disc, freshman **MARK BRYANT** (192-8 with HS disc) will start the season as number one with Gordien (202-3) not eligible until the Spring Quarter. **SCOTT WELLS** (174-2), who was expected to carry the load until Gordien became eligible, had a serious foot injury during the Fall and may not be able to contribute at all. "Bryant has fine potential," Bush says, "but he must get used to the big disc and the higher level of competition we meet every week." When Gordien joins the Bruins, he'll give UCLA a top scoring threat in the NCAA Championships, an event UCLA has not scored in since 1974. JC transfer **NIEL BERGQUIST** (160-5) adds depth here, as does Laut (157-3) and **HARRY McINTYRE** (151-7).

TED DeMILL (248-4) should be over 250 feet according to Bush, if he can stay away from injuries. **MIKE CARLI** (230-11) won the Cal State JUCO championship and **TIM D'ANGELO** (210-5) improved over 20 feet last year and has had good Fall work-outs. They give the Bruins a strong dual meet squad with possible NCAA point potential. Decathlete

EUGENE LEONI (187-0), who has scored 6480 as a prep, may be able to give some dual meet assistance here, too.

OVERALL ASSESSMENT: Bush views the season ahead with optimism: "I think we will have a better team than last year. When we get everyone healthy, we have the potential to be the top dual meet team in the nation again. We really have just about every event covered.

"We could be even better than last year in the big meets and the '78 squad almost won the NCAA title. This is a young team, but we have some outstanding seniors to give us great leadership. To say the least, we are very excited."

UCLA's POST-WAR RECORD

Here is UCLA's post-war "record." Each yearly line shows the Bruins' dual meet record and the complete records of both Ducky Drake and Jim Bush, the UCLA finish in the *Track & Field News* dual meet rankings (DMF), the placing in the conference meet (CF) and the Bruin finish in the NCAA meet (NCF). In some 33 seasons, the UCLA dual record is an impressive 209-65-0 for a super .763 winning percentage.

In His 15th Season at UCLA . . .

JIM BUSH

. . . His 28th as a T&F Coach



JAMES STANLEY "JIM" BUSH is in his 15th season as UCLA's highly-respected track and field coach. In all, he's in his 28th year as a mentor in the international sport of T&F.

He'll cap this '79 season as the head coach of the U.S. team in the Pan-American Games at San Juan, Puerto Rico, in July.

It is worth noting that Bush has done all his coaching in California, first as a graduate assistant at Berkeley High School (1951), seven at Fullerton High School (1952-59), two at Fullerton Junior College (1960-61), three at Occidental College (1962-64) and now in his 15th at UCLA.

But, of course, it has been at UCLA that Jim Bush has become recognized nationally as a premier coach. Here is a listing of his important Bruin coaching achievements:

- winner of four NCAA team championships (1966-71-72-73), the only living coach to win three NCAA titles in a row . . .
- winner of five Pacific-8 Conference team championships (1966-69-70-71-73) . . .
- winner of seven crosstown dual meets (1966-67-70-72-73-74-75), most satisfying because the Bruins had never won against USC until Bush arrived at Westwood, having lost 32 straight . . .
- winner of an unprecedented six straight NCAA mile relays (1969-70-71-72-73-74) and seven consecutive Pac-8 mile relays (1968-69-70-71-72-73-74) . . .
- named "Coach of the Year" by vote of his fellow members of the U.S. Track Coaches' Assn. on two occasions, 1971 and '73, the first coach in his sport to be so honored twice . . .
- served as president of the U.S. Track Coaches Assn. (1972-73) . . .
- voted into Kern County's "Hall of Fame" for his athletic achievements . . .

Several other outstanding coaching career highlights include his Bruins winning both NCAA 440 and mile relays in one meet (1966) and having two of his quarter-milers (John Smith and Wayne Collett) break and equal the 440 record in the same race (1971) in 44.5 and 44.7, respectively.

It should be noted that Bush is the author of two popular track and field books: "Inside Track," published in 1972 by Contemporary Publishing in Chicago, Ill., and "Dynamic Track & Field," published in 1978 by Allyn & Bacon in Boston, Mass. The latter is rated one of the top textbooks in T&F history.

This year of 1979 should be another big one for Bush and UCLA. The Bruins have two NCAA champions returning, high hurdler Gregory Foster and shot putter Dave Laut, and

other standout performers on what figures to be a strong Pac-10 and NCAA title contender.

Following graduation from University of California in 1951, he entered graduate school there and served as a student football coach under Pappy Waldorf and also helped coach track at Berkeley High.

Then, 1952, he went to Fullerton High where he was to teach and coach for the next seven years. His teams won many championships, including the school's first varsity track and cross country league titles in history.

He then moved to Fullerton JC where his first track team there in 1960 won a conference title for the first time in 20 years and set two National JC records. His '61 team swept to an undefeated season, winning the first Southern California and State JC track title in the school's history.

It came as no surprise when Bush was Occidental's choice to succeed Chuck Coker as the Tiger cinder boss in 1962. His fantastic success continued at Oxy, rated the country's foremost small college track power. Incidentally, he posted three straight dual wins over UCLA while at Oxy.

Bush was athletic director J.D. Morgan's popular choice to take over for the veteran Elvin "Ducky" Drake, when the latter retired after 18 years (1947-64) at the UCLA track helm to concentrate on his duties as the Bruins' head athletic trainer.

Born Sept. 15, 1926 in Cleveland, O., he came west with his family in '29. Jim attended Bakersfield High, competing in both track and football. Incidentally, his prep coach was the

late Burnett "Cap" Haralson, 1923 UCLA track captain. He graduated in 1944 and shortly thereafter joined the Naval Air Corps.

Following World War II, he entered Bakersfield JC and lettered in football and track one year (1947-48). It was at Bakersfield, however, that he suffered a hamstring muscle injury that was to hamper his entire running career.

He then transferred to UC Berkeley in the fall of 1948. As a Physical Education major there, he competed in track as a quarter-miler for three years.

Bush also is highly regarded in international track circles.

Incidentally, Bush will coach all the runners, from sprinters to distance runners, this season. Jim Kiefer will continue to handle the field eventers. Two new staff members, Henderson Cooper and Russ Hodge, both former Bruin stars, will serve as an administrative assistant and graduate aide, respectively.

Jim is the proud father of a married daughter, Mrs. Jean Ferdig, a school teacher, and a married son, Don.

THE COACHING STAFF

JIM KIEFER

Assistant Coach



It's taken only two seasons as the Bruins' full-time assistant coach for Jim Kiefer to earn both respect and accolades as one of the nation's fine young field event mentors. His charges have shown well in both of the last two seasons, both in dual meet competition and in the NCAA Championships, where UCLA had placers in the HJ, PV, TJ and SP.

Kiefer coached his first NCAA champions as well, with Mike Tully winning the vault and Dave Laut taking the

shot. Tully, triple jumper Willie Banks, and high jumper Dwayne Joseph also won conference titles under Kiefer's guidance.

Perhaps most impressive is Laut, who came to UCLA as a 61-9½ JUCO champ and was promptly transformed into an NCAA champ with a best of 66-1¼. Along the same lines is Bruin-to-be Marcus Gordien, whose training with the Bruins during the Fall months resulted in a SP improvement from 60-0½ in '78 to 62-1½ in his first meet of 1979!

"I'm extremely pleased with Jim as our field events coach," said Bruin boss Jim Bush. "He's made tremendous strides in his two years here and he's now one of the top field event coaches in the United States, I feel. He's gained both the athlete's respect and mine as well.

"I feel fortunate to have him as my full-time assistant coach."

"Enthusiastic" hardly describes the verve that Kiefer brings to his job, but it's apparent from watching at any workout, as he tutors his troops. He not only gives the Bruins pointers on the do's and don't's of the infield events, but also provided technical narration last season for KNXT's "Sunday Sports Final" in their segment profiling Mike Tully.

Kiefer was a fine triple jumper in his own right at California, where he posted a best of 49-4½ as a senior in 1968. He placed fifth in the '68 Pacific-8 TJ.

Right after graduation, he started coaching as a volunteer at Mt. Miguel HS and then served as a volunteer assistant at San Diego State in July, 1969, working with such notables as 1976 Olympic Long Jump gold medalist Arnie Robinson and 7-1 high jumper Jerry Culp, who later attended USC. His stint as a graduate assistant at SDS ended in June, 1972, after his service with the Army.

Warren HS in Downey, Ca. was Kiefer's first exposure as a head coach and he led his teams in cross country and track to a combined 48-10 record in his three years there. During his stay, Warren captured its first league honors in each sport. He became assistant coach at El Camino College in the Fall of 1975 and immediately produced one State JUCO champ well known to current Bruin T&F followers—pole vaulter Charlie Brown.

In fact, Kiefer-coached field eventers scored all of ECC's State JUCO points that year, with four men scoring enough to claim tenth place in the team scoring race. He became the UCLA assistant coach before the start of the 1976-77 school year, replacing Tom Tellez, who left UCLA to take the head coaching position at the University of Houston.

Kiefer is married to the former Linda Moore and they have three children, James, Jr., 8½, Kate, 4½ and Megan Michele, now one year old. They reside in Walnut, Ca.

RUSS HODGE

Graduate Assistant Coach



Former world decathlon record-holder and ex-Bruin formally joins Jim Bush's staff this season as a graduate assistant. He's been helping the Bruins with their weight-training programs since his graduation from Bruintown.

"He'll not only help us with the runners, but he'll assist all of our track and field athletes with their weight training programs off the track," commented Bush. "Russ has given us valuable assistance since his graduation and we're happy to have him on

our staff."

A great athlete in his own right, Hodge set a world decathlon record in 1966 with an 8,230-point performance in the Los Angeles Coliseum. He kept the record for some ten months before West Germany's Kurt Bendlin set it higher again in 1967. He's been world-ranked numerous times by *Track & Field News*, and only numerous nagging injuries prevented him from attaining even greater heights in decathlon competition.

He came to UCLA in time for the 1968 season after transferring from Santa Monica City College. While with UCLA, he managed to put the shot 60-11, still eighth on the Bruins' all-time list.

Still active in athletic affairs, Hodge is currently owner of an Athletic Attic Sporting Goods store in Century City, Ca. and is a member of the President's Council on Physical Fitness. He is also an athlete's representative on the US Olympic Committee. An expert in nutrition, he developed his own nutritional supplement, Factor RHB, used by numerous athletes in both college and professional sports, including many of the present Bruin tracksters.

Hodge is single and was born September 9, 1939 in Roscoe, N.Y. He currently resides near UCLA in Westwood.

Former UCLA quarter-miler Henderson Cooper becomes part of the Bruin T&F staff as an Administrative Assistant this season. He'll assist Bruin coach Jim Bush in both on-track and off-track duties.

A former volunteer assistant coach at Hamilton High School in Los Angeles, Cooper is currently in private business and will help the Bruins in a part-time capacity.

While at UCLA in 1971 and 1973, Cooper ran the 440 with a best of 47.8 on teams that both won NCAA titles. He came to the Bruins from Santa Monica City College and Hamilton HS, where he placed third in the Los Angeles City quarter in 1969, while serving as track captain.

Cooper is single and was born on April 25, 1950, and still makes his home in Los Angeles.

The first Pac-10 title meet will be held in the home of one of the conference's new members, the Arizona State Sun Angel Stadium in Tempe, Az. Last year, USC squeaked by with their fifth straight loop crown as a mad four-way charge at the crown almost dethroned the Trojans.

UCLA has finished in the top three in this meet in 11 of the last 12 years, including third place finishes for the last three years. Under Bush, UCLA has won five times (1966-69-70-71-73), been second thrice (1972-74-75), third four times (1967-76-77-78), fifth once (1968) and sixth once (1965).

UCLA IN NCAA TITLE MEETS

At University of Illinois, Champaign, Illinois, May 31-
June 2

UCLA tied for second place in the NCAA meet last season, finishing with UTEP at 50 points, behind USC's winning total of 59. The Bruins crowned three champions: junior high hurdler Greg Foster, who ran an American record 13.22, senior pole vaulter Mike Tully, who took an NCAA indoor-outdoor double at a meet record of 18-1¾, after scaling a World Indoor best 18-5¼ earlier in the year and junior shot-putter Dave Laut, who came through with a school record 66-1¼ in the clutch to beat a closely-bunched field.

Under coach Bush, UCLA has won four NCAA tiaras in 1966-71-72-73, finished in the runner-up slot thrice (1974-75-78), third once (1967), fifth three times (1968-69-77), seventh in 1970, eighth in 1965 and twelfth in 1976. UCLA also won their other NCAA T&F title in 1956 under Ducky Drake.
