

OUTDOOR HIGHLIGHTS

With the Sun Belt not quite as sunny as usual this year, early-season outdoor activity has been less notable, although the West Coast has already seen some fine throwing.

GREEN HAMMERS 232-4

Irvine, California, February 19—With the world's elite closing in on 280-feet, one hesitates to wax too ecstatic about U.S. hammer prospects, but Cal State Long Beach's Bill Green is certainly performing well enough to give rise to some hope for the future.

A 22-year-old senior, Green ranked No. 3 in the nation last year, reaching 230-1. Off to a fine start this year, he hit 232-4 here, the best ever by an American-born collegian, surpassing Al Schoterman's 1972 mark of 231-3. Green now rates as the No. 10 American of all-time.

On the women's side, Stanford junior Carol Cady improved her discus PR to 189-1, good for No. 5 all-time among Americans.

Long Beach, March 5—Throwing in his home circle at the Long Beach Relays, Bill Green continued his hammer improvement with a 235-7 spin. Throwing consistently well, Green had his first four throws over 222 before fouling his last two.

Moving well up on the all-time U.S. list, the 6-2/230 Green is now at No. 5, and No. 7 collegian ever (the 6 ahead of him on that list all being foreigners).

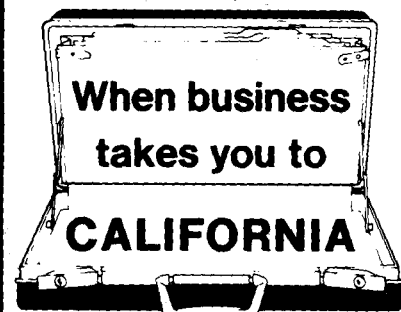
