100 Meters:

Ricky Carrigan (Compton had rolled over all of his competition in the State during travels that had taken him as far north as the Fresno Relays, where he blazed his seasonal best, a 10.41. Tim Martin (San Clemente) seemed capable of pressing the Compton star, racing 10.58, with Ato Boldon (Piedmont Hills, San Jose) 10.47w, 10.57, a Jamaican national transfer by way of Jamaica, New York (really, it is the school he attended last year) toughest from the North. In San Diego Darnay Scott (Kearney) took the big Section Finals showdown at 10.59, with Riley Washington (Chula Vista, San Diego) racing that same time during the regular season.

In Friday's State Prelim Heats Ricky Carrigan set out early to show who was boss, blazing a 10.32w (+2.56 meters per second of aiding wind) Heat 1 win that had him pull away early from Jaccobi Williams (Antioch) 10.60w. L. A. City Champ, Leonice Brown (San Fernando) was an interesting no-show. In Heat 2 Ato Boldon (Piedmont Hills, San Jose) was caught leaning back at the gun, with Matt Harding (San Dimas) running down quick-starting Donnell Moore (Crenshaw, L.A.) with a great final 50 that had the San Dimas/University of Hawaii bound footballer race 10.45w (+3.21) with Boldon moving up to 2nd at 10.65w. Heat 3 had Darnay Scott (Kearney, S.D.) also leaning back at the gun, give up two meters in the first fifteen to Tim Martin (San Clemente), then show amazing power in coming to within a half a meter at the finish 10.49w-10.53w (+2.55). In Heat 4, Riley Washington (Southwest, San Diego) caught quick starting Shon Lewis (Wilcox, Santa Clara) and moved to a meter and a half lead through 50 meters before winning at 10.49w (+2.53). Damon Butler (Tulare) looked good at 10.52w in 2nd. With the generous breezes, it took 10.61 to make the field of nine Finals.

Great anticipation awaited the start of this event in the Finals, with six of the state's ten sections represented at the line. Carrigan's Compton team was the slight team favorites after the 4x100 relay win earlier in the evening, so Ricky had a little special moti-

Running Event Instructions:

In the trials for running events, there will be four heats in each event. The heat winners in each heat will advance to the finals along with the five non-winning runners with the fastest times.

In the 1600 meter run, there will be two heats. The top three finishers in each heat along with the three non-placing runners with the fastest times will advance to the finals.

Field Event Instructions:

The nine competitors with the best marks in each event qualify for Saturday's finals. Please note that the <u>miss rule</u> will be applied in the high jump and pole vault to determine the nine qualifiers. Marks recorded in the trials will not be carried into the finals; however, marks made in the trials could be submitted as meet or national records.

On Friday, each of the contestants in the long jump, triple jump, shot put and discus will be allowed three (3) attempts. On Saturday, all finalists will be given six (6) final attempts. vation. At the gun it was Tim Martin (San Clemente) with the quickest reaction, with Riley Washington, the winner of the Sunkist Indoor 50 meter event in January, moving to a very slight lead through the halfway point. At 70 meters Matthew Harding had edged into the lead, with Carrigan also starting his move through the pack there. In the final third of the event it was the overdrive gear that has taken Carrigan to an undefeated local season

200 Meters:

Ricky Carrigan (Compton) had also been able to comfortably handle the State's best in a series of Invitational wins here, with a hand-timed 20.7 from League, and 21.07 in the State Qualifier. Darnay Scott (Kearney, San Diego) cranked 21.27 in the Section Meet, with Ato Boldon (Piedmont Hills, San Jose) (21.35w, 21.48) second at Arcadia to Carrigan. Strong in Section Finals races were relative unknown, John Carter (Washington,

LA.) 21.46 and Damon Butler (Tulare) 21.57.

With the first seed in the 200 in Heat 1, as the 100, Mr. Carrigan came to roll in qualifying here. Catching a rare wind-legal race (+1.87) Carrigan's piston-like stride carried him to a seven meter 20.85 win over Riley Washington (Southwest, San Diego) 21.43. The 20.85 is the nation's #3 time for the year and as impressive an effort as there has been by a California halflapper in recent years. In Heat 2 Darnay Scott (Kearney, San Diego) turned the tables on his 100 Heat conqueror, Tim Martin (San Clemente), getting out closer and running the turn hard on the way to a 21.20w (+2.49)-21.35w win. Damon Buller (Tulare) was strong in a 21.42w (+2.04) Heat 3 win, with Ato Boldon (Piedmont Hills) holding off Matt Harding (San Dimas) 21.34w (+2.27)-21.38w in the final qualifier. Eight ran 21.53 or better in outsifying.

ter in qualifying. By the time the 200 was held the team battle had come down to Comp-ton against Esperanza. Mark Parlin had taken 2nd in the Discus, Roshawn Sims was an impressive 3rd in the 400, and Trevor Lycett tied for 6th in the Vault for Esperanza, with Parlin the best Shot Putter in State by seven feet. Esperanza would total 24-0 1/2, with Compton 20 already off the 4x100 Relay win and Carrigan's 100 triumph. A win here would give Ricky's crew 30 and a win. Heat winners Ato Boldon (Lane 3), Carrigan (Lane 4), and Damay Scott (Lane 5) filled out the center of the track in the finals Boldon rocketed out, coming up on Carrigan's shoulder midway through the turn, with Darnay Scott also cranking it up around the curve, with Carrigan in third place between the two leaders as Boldon hit the 100 meter starting line at 11.0. The wind for the race was an aiding 3.50 mps, and it would lift the group down the straightaway. In the homestretch, Carrigan mounted another of his "Ricky-gear" moves and powered to a two meter win at 20.84. Scott continued his fine late season peak, finishing strongly at 20.98 in second, with Bol don next at the finish in 21.17. Carrigan finished an undefeated season in the sprints, with a series of very, very quick races in big Invitationals that started way back in early March. Ricky's 10.41 ended the season as the #3 clocking nationally, with his legal 20.85 from Friday's qualifying the #3 in the country. Carrigan truly had one of the better seasons of sprinting in State history.

400 Meters:

The One Lap event was a very interesting one heading into the State Meet. Ed Hervey (Compton) handled a good group in big Southern Section qualifying Meets, topping out at 47.13 in taking cross-city rival Gerald McCladdie (Centennial, Compton) 47.57. Word filtered down about some exceptional talent up north. Eleventh graders Richard Dupree (Roosevelt, Fresno), a basketballer, surprisingly improved to 47.44 by mid-season, with Milton Hughes (Stagg, Stockton) rating great reviews for a 47.71-1:53.52 Sac-Joaquin Section Finals double win. Lamont Warren (Dorsey, LA.) was coming off a bad hamstring, but took the LA. City meet at 48.35 and had a good relay leg there.

Heat 1 featured Richard Dupree and Edwin Hervey. Dupree held a one meter lead through a 22.6 first 200, with a half a meter at the head of the homestretch (34.7 300m). With the winner only assured a spot in the Finals Hervey pressed the entire homestretch, but could not put a dent in the very narrow margin that Dupree held. Suddenly with 10 meters to go Hervey grabbed his hamstring and totally broke stride. It was clear that something was seriously wrong. As the team favorites prior to the start of the meet this was very serious news for Compton, which had led 400m relay qualifying at 41.60 and had planned on Hervey's help here and in the 200. Dupree's time was a quick 47.39 with Hervey 47.85 in secord. Heat 2 had Gerald McCladdie take it out through a 22.6 200, with the Centennial star a 5 meter lead at 34.8 at

the 300. Arcadia winner Derek Shepard (Lincoln, San Francisco) showed some power on the homestretch, but finished well back of McCladdie's 47.70 at 48.56 to squeeze into the Fi-nals. Heat 3 would feature Milton Hughes of Stagg in Stockton and a good group. The Stagg eleventh grader uses a standing start in blocks, with the starters calling everyone up the first time the race went to the set command as Hughes was teetering for-ward, certain to be disqualified but for the mercy of the starting crew. The second time they came to their marks Hughes' reaction to the gun was purposefully very slow, giving everyone a couple of meters before he was out. Roshawn Sims (Esperanza, Anaheim) lead through a 23.7 200 on the way to a 48.46 win, with Hughes a non-qualifying third at 49.77. Heat 4 featured a wire to wire struggle between LaSalle Hughes (Rubidoux, Riverside) and Shante Williams (Independence, San Jose), with the duo coming by 200m in 22.8 on the way to Hughey's 48.27-48.49 win

In the Finals Hervey did not show up to the starting line, as the condition described as a cramp on Friday flared up after his leg on the winning Saturday Finals 4x100 team. Richard Dupree was in Lane 5 with Gerald McCladdie in 6 carrying the frustration of the team's dropped baton in the 4x400 in Friday's qualifying (see that event for that situation). Gerald took the race out very hard from the gun, eating up most of the stagger on Lane 7's LaSalle Hughey around the first turn. Down the backstretch the race flew, with Roshawn Sims, inspired by Esperarza's team chances, joining McCladdie at 22.7 for 200 meters. At the 300 meter point at the head of the straightaway McCladdie held a one meter lead over Sims and Dupree, who had charged the third 100. Dupree has a light and quick, rhythm to his running style that keeps him going better than most at the end of the one lap event, here edging up to and past McCladdie in the final 50 meters, with Gerald desperately pumping his arms to fight skowing. Dupree won by a bit more than a meter in 47.21, with McCladdie 47.44, and Sims running easily his best time in 47.73 in third to really help his team's title struggle. Dupree is very, very talented, with the basketballer's rise to a State title during his first year in the sport more than a little surprising.

reka) 1:53.67 in a great North Coast Section run. Milton Hughes (Stagg, Stockton) impressed observers with his finish in the Sac Joaquin Meet, nipping soph Brian Wilkinson (Merced) 1:53.52-1:53.52

In the Prelims, Bryan Woodward easily controlled Heat 1 with a 13.1 final 100m to the finish in his 1:55.17 victory. In Heat 2 Robert Price (El Cerrito) lead into the homestretch, where fluid ninth grader Vondre Armour (Bakersfield) started a charge that had him just outlean Price (1:55.10-1:55.13) at the finish, with both falling. Red flags went up, but when the results arrived no one had been disqualified. In Heat 3, Dan Niednagel (Dana Hills) pushed the third 200 tougher than in any of the evening's any other qualifying races, coming through at 1:24.7 on the way to a 1:54.62 win. In Heat 4 Mike Terry (El Modena) roared a big final straightaway in taking surprising Dustin Rawls (Lincoln, San Francisco) 1:55.20-1:55.47.

In the Finals, outstanding soph Isaac Sanchez (Castle Park, San Diego) took over early when there were no other volunteers, going through the 200 at 26.0, with the tempo slowing to 2:00 800 pace over the next 100m, and the pack coming by the 300m at 41.0. Dan Niednagel, an outstanding cross country runner without the speed to kick like many in the race, could not let the pace lag too far, so he upped the tempo during the homestretch straightaway 100m at the end of lap one to 14.3, and passed Sanchez on the inside while leading past the 400 at 55.3. In his qualifying heat Niednagel has pushed the third 200 well under

Friday's Prelim Heats both started at a crawl. Pascual Morales (Washington, Easton) took Heat 1 out in 65.2-2:10.6, with Louie Quintana up on the leader's shoulder through two laps. With 600 meters to go a pack of 10 was within five meters, with Quintana and Richie Boulet (Drake, San Anselmo) abreast at 3:16.7 with one two go. A 30.3 gave Louie a 1 meter lead with half a lap to go, a margin he held over fast charging Robert Walker (San Pasqual, Escondido) into the tape 4:16.26.4:16.50 (final 400 59.7). Heat 2 featured a leisurely 66.1-2:12.7 and 3:17.8 pace, with Todd Tressler (San Marcos) putting in a bit of a move at the gun. Daniel Das Neves (Helix, La Mesa) won the last 150 sprint and the heat at 4:17.93.

The 1600m Finals was interesting and kind of strange. Hector Hernandez took the pace out through 14.6 for the first turn 100 meters, with Daniel Das Neves assuming the pacing duties through a 30.6 first 200 and surprisingly slow 64.0 first lap. Louie Quintana sat on the leader's shoulder at the 400, with the entire field within five meters at that point. Through the 800 things did not change, with Steve Guerini (Santa Rosa) edging up near the front at 2:10.1. Everyone waited for Quintana's move to take the race, with the Arroyo Grande star pressing the pace with a 15.2 ninth 100 meters

(4:03.1 1600 pace-quite a drop in tempo from the 4:20.2 pacing of the first two laps), with Louie taking the lead halfway down the backstretch of the third lap, with the 1000 meler point reached in 3:40.6 (15.4 for the last 100 and 30.6 for the last half lap). Between the 1000 and 1200 meter point Louie continued to press (15.5 for 11th 100m segment and 14.7 coming into the gun lap for 30.3 for the 6th 200), passing the 1200 at 3:11.0 (third 400 60.9). Quintana had the lead, but Das Neves, Hemandez, Richie Boulet (Drake, San Anselmo). and Steve Guerrini were close and looked full of run. Louie led into the final lap, covering the 100m around the north turn at 15.2, with Hernandez north turn at 15.2, with Hernandez challenging down the backstretch, be-fore Louie fought him off (1400m point reached at 3:42.2–31.2 for last 200m). At the 1400 point it was Dan-iel Das Neves who moved up to press Quintana, shadowing him around the turn and pouncing as the race headed into the straightaway. Das Neves raced away with 100 to go, with Quinraced away with 100 to go, with Culin-tana looking very fatigued, not able to generate any power out of his stride. Down the final stratch Todd Tressler and Guernini also charged by. Das Neves ended the winner at 4:12.22, with Tressler (4:13.02), and Guerrini (4:13.85) also in ahead of Quintana (4:14.43), who fell to the track with his head in his hands just past the fin-ish line. The final 800 of the race had taken just a little bit over 2:01.

The Centennial problem in the heats threw the event pretty wide open. It was obvious from the start of the Fi-nals race that Morningside had special motivation this event. Defending State Champ Kevin Carl-son (Katella, Anaheim) put together a fine season with a best of 7-0 but some good attempts at higher heights, with 1990 runner-up Avery Anderson (North, Riverside) slowly coming back from injury to qualify for State at 6-8. Tim Rucks (Milpitas), fourth in the O'Neill (Rubidoux, Riverside) over 6-

It took 6-6 to make the Finals, with the Prelims eliminating none of the 6-10 athletes, with Avery Anderson also qualifying on at 6-7.

The finals turned out to be a super competition, with the event lasting a bit after the final running race and drawing the crowd's attention to some very good jumping by the same group as 1991. John Hamilton of San Marcos in the San Diego Section could not clear the opening 6-4 height, with Mark Montgomery (Lynwood) edging Eddie Tindal (Enterprise, Redding) and Tim Ross for 7th on misses when the trio cleared 6-8 and could go no higher. Four athletes (Rucks, Anderson, Haynes, and O'Neill) were jumping at 6-11 with Carlson sur-prisingly passing. Rucks and Anderson were over 6-11 on their first jumps, with Oleson O'Neill (degring a lifetime with Olsson-O'Neill clearing a lifetime best on his third attempt. At 7-0

Pole Vault:

The best vaulters to move on to the State Meet were from the North, with David Cox (Hoover, Fresno) 16-7 3/4 for one of the best marks in the country. Matt McCauley (Nevada Union, Grass Valley) was 16-0 with P. J. Chadwick (Woodland) 15-7 1/2.

The winds that come from the west and around the huge concrete bleachers swirl onto the main field and typically bring havoc to this event, 199 was an exception, with consistent 2-4 meter per second aiding breezes from the south at the backs of the sprinters in their races providing the same con-sistent aide to the Pole Vaulters, whose runway is on the same side of the track.
