Carlmont boys, M-A girls take team championships

If any doubt existed that San Mateo High School's Matt Giusto is the favorite to repeat as Central Coast Section cross country champion, Giusto erased it by winning Thursday's Peninsula Athletic League finals.

Only two runners appear capable of dethroning Giusto in the CCS meet Nov. 22 - Leigh's Chris Craig and Del Mar's

Legan and Craig placed sixth and 11th, respectively, in last year's CCS meet, finishing 19.2 and 32.2 seconds behind Giusto. Legan won the mile in

the CCS track finals last spring.

Giusto, who completed Belmont's 2.9mile Crystal Springs course in 15:04.8 in last year's CCS meet, demonstrated an impressive level of improvement Thursday, winning the PAL race in a blazing 14:40.3.

The weather was ideal Thursday not too warm, not chilly, with a slight breeze - and Giusto's time is believed among the fastest half-dozen times ever

recorded at Crystal Springs.

Meanwhile, Carlmont, led by sixthplace finisher Mike Montazer, won the team title with 49 points to Menlo-Atherton's 57. Capuchino, led by thirdplace finisher Paul Ghidossi, was third with 94 points.

Burlingame's Silvia Aguirre ran 18:54.3 to win the girls' race by 27 seconds over teammate Toni Hartlaub. M-A compiled 63 points to edge Aragon (67) and Mills (68) for the team title.

Giusto said he was most concerned about Mills' Chris Becerra, who fin-

ished second in 15:15.7.

"I knew he'd try to set a fast pace," Giusto said. "Once I was able to keep up with him for a while, I felt good. I pushed hard, and I was able to catch my breath on the downhill stretches.

'I've worked on bringing my arms in (closer to his body) more, and that's improved my lateral motion and helped me become a better hill runner."

"He's certainly one of the best runners I've ever had ... He's probably the best," said Don Dooley, in his 16th season as San Mateo coach.

"He's a hard worker, and he has a super attitude. He's good for the other runners. All of the qualities that outstanding athletes have, he has."
