Shola and Nnenna Lynch's

Sister

Shola and Nnenna Lynch have mastered the art of balancing athletics and academics. With an impressive list of achievements to their credit—both on the track and in the classroom—these scholar-athlete sisters seem to have a secret family formula for success. Not so, they say. It's just a matter of combining their talent with hard work, dedication and sacrifice.

The Lynchs started their juggling acts at a young age. As a 14-year-old, Shola won the 800m title at the U.S. Junior Championships. She went on to become a track and field All-American at the University of Texas, Austin. Upon graduation, Shola accepted a fellowship to study public history resource management at the University of California-Riverside, where she is working toward a masters in history and a professional degree in museum curating.

Following in her sister's footsteps, Nnenna began running at the age of 10. As one of the most accomplished student-athletes in Villanova University's history, she graduated with a 3.91 grade point average. She accumulated eight NCAA All-American honors, and in her senior year was a finalist in both the mile and 3,000m at the 1993 NCAA Division I Indoor Track Championships. Her

accomplishments won her a prestigious Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University, where she is currently studying.

Despite these impressive achievements, Nnenna and Shola do not boast of any complex formula for their success. More than any other factor, they attribute it to their overwhelming love of running.

"As a youngster, naturally, I wanted to succeed, but how I progressed and the way I progressed was based more on loving running and enjoying my relationship with my coach and my teammates than on an impressive need to succeed," says Shola.

Nnenna also believes that her attraction to the sport played a big part in her progression. "I always loved and enjoyed running, so it was never a chore for me," says Nnenna, a three-time Kinney Cross Country Championships finalist. "By the time you hit college, balancing athletics and academics is a way of life. For me, it's not really something that I think about doing."

Though both are eager to confess their love for the sport, they also recognize the delicate line drawn between loving running and being too intense about it.

"If you're too intense, it only leads to disaster," says Shola, now competing internationally at the world-class level as a member of the Foot Locker Athletic Club. "All of a sudden everything—what you're eating, how much you sleep, how much you study, whether you can go out with your friends—gets blown out of proportion."

Nnenna, who was named the NCAA Woman of the Year in 1993 and was also

featured in *People* magazine's 1994 Most Beautiful People issue, agrees that too much pressure can be detrimental to any athlete.

"I have high standards, but I try not to put too much pressure on myself," she says. "I never say it's the end of the world to lose a race. Bad experiences or what other people might consider failures, I try to look at as learning experiences."

Aside from a natural love of the sport, the Lynches also say that their ability to prioritize has helped them in becoming well-rounded individuals.

"I think figuring out what your priorities are in life is very important," says Shola. "Balancing them is important too. It means being honest with yourself. For instance, if I have a lot of schoolwork and I'm up really late and I have to skip a practice, instead of feeling guilty about it, I accept that this is the way my priorities fall. And I just do it without stressing out about it."

Nnenna shares her sister's sentiments. "Usually, school and running come head to head as far as priorities are concerned," she says.

"The most difficult part about trying to balance athletics and academics is having to say 'no' to a lot of things—a lot of social occasions," says Nnenna. "But it's also part of what keeps me in touch with what I need to do, instead of getting distracted with what's going on. It's one of the hardest things, but it's also good because it keeps me headed on the path that I'm on. I constantly have to reevaluate myself and remind myself."

Their ability to deal with setbacks in a productive manner is another reason the Lynches find themselves on the road to success.

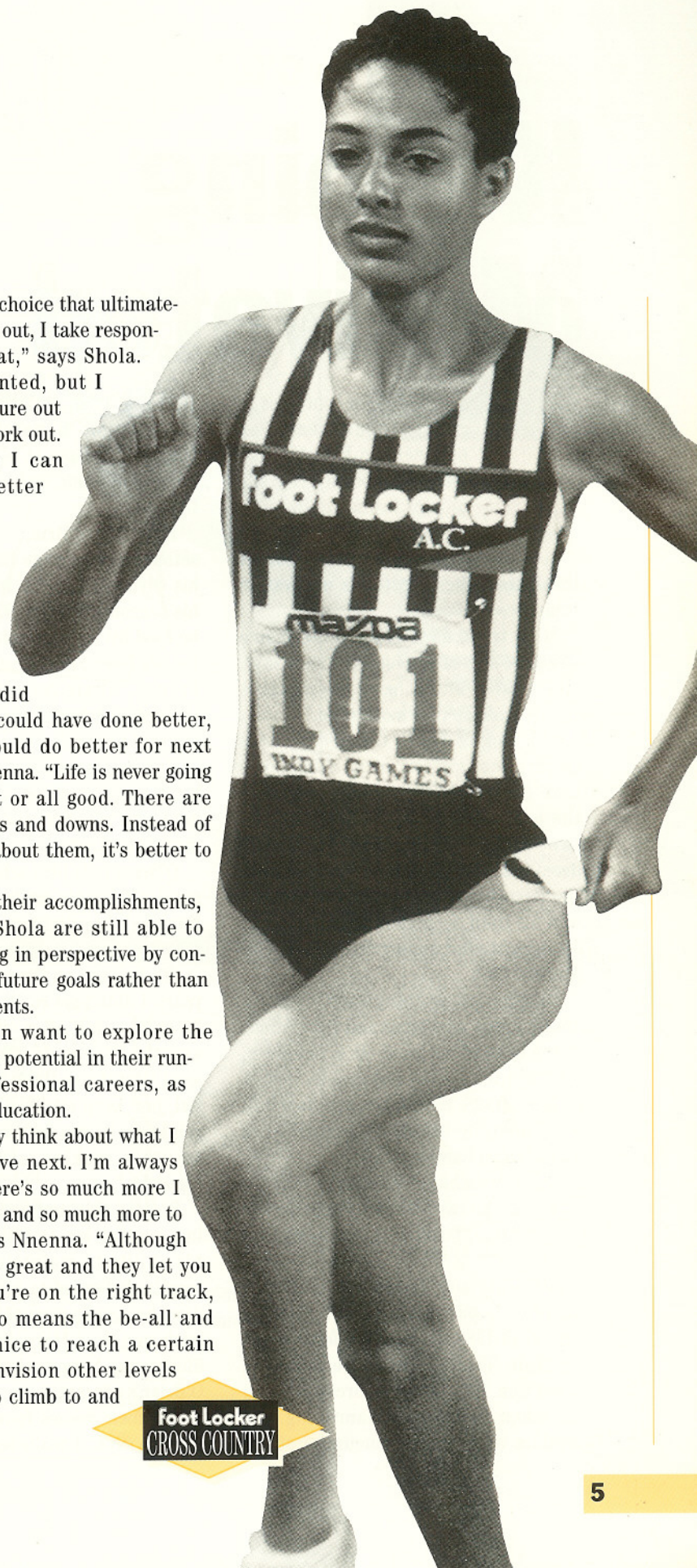
"If I make a choice that ultimately doesn't work out, I take responsibility for that," says Shola. "I'm disappointed, but I also try and figure out why it didn't work out. So next time I can make a better choice."

"I like to evaluate setbacks and find out if something was my fault and what I did wrong, how I could have done better, and what I could do better for next time," says Nnenna. "Life is never going to be all great or all good. There are going to be ups and downs. Instead of getting upset about them, it's better to expect them."

With all of their accomplishments, Nnenna and Shola are still able to keep everything in perspective by concentrating on future goals rather than past achievements.

Both women want to explore the depths of their potential in their running and professional careers, as well as their education.

"I constantly think about what I want to achieve next. I'm always aware that there's so much more I could be doing and so much more to be done," says Nnenna. "Although successes are great and they let you know that you're on the right track, they are by no means the be-all and end-all. It's nice to reach a certain level, but I envision other levels that I'd like to climb to and reach."

Decathlete Dan O'Brien

Keeping Motivated

As Dan O'Brien continues to conquer every decathlon opponent in his path, it's difficult to believe that the idea of losing could enter his mind. Yet, not only does this world record holder think about it, he gets his motivation from it.

"I try to get more of a positive than a negative out of losing," O'Brien says. "It's good to let losing or the mistakes you've made be your motivation."

If losing is where O'Brien gets his inspiration, his recent performances have given him little to think about. In the past three years, he has captured two world championships in the decathlon and set new world records in the decathlon and the heptathlon. He won his third decathlon national title in June, right after joining the Foot Locker Athletic Club.

Despite his winning ways, O'Brien always keeps past trials and tribulations in the back of his mind. As a youngster, he was often on the losing side, including last-place Little League baseball teams and the runner-up football team in the state championships.

"I'm accustomed to not winning all the time," he says. "When you don't win all the time, I think it teaches you a lot."

Adversity and disappointment have been a big part of O'Brien's athletic career. In 1988, he qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials, where he won the decathlon 100, but was forced to drop out when he pulled a hamstring. His troubles were again pronounced at the

1992 U.S. trials in New Orleans, where the Olympic hopeful missed three straight attempts at his opening height in the pole vault, and failed to make the U.S. team.

However, O'Brien has never let his setbacks discourage him or extinguish his Olympic dreams. Instead of ending his season after the '92 Olympic trials, he used his loss as motivation to prepare for the Deca Star Decathlon in Talence, France, where he defeated Olympic champion Robert Zmelik and shattered the world record.

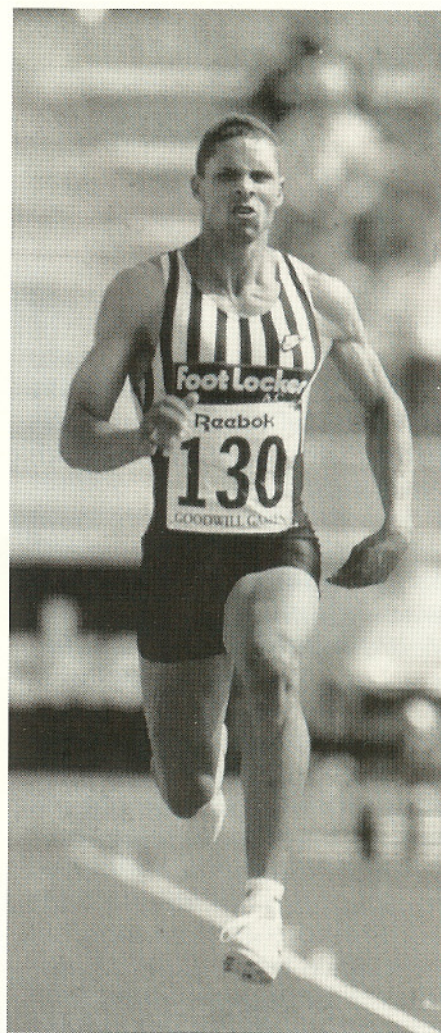
Hoping his troubles are behind him, he is concentrating on his "ultimate" goal—to win the 1996 Olympic gold medal in Atlanta.

O'Brien tells high school runners with similar Olympic aspirations the same thing he's been telling himself for years: "Don't give up."

"To become an Olympic athlete takes years. I didn't get really good until I was 24 or 25—well after college was over," says the 28-year-old. "Don't get discouraged, and if you think you've got potential, just keep clicking away and before you know it, in a few years, you're going to start making some big breakthroughs."

Besides thinking positively about losing, another key to O'Brien's success is his ability to maintain his focus and remain dedicated to his training. These days, he spends most of his time working with coaches Mike Keller and Rick Sloan, who have contributed greatly to O'Brien's success.

"My focus comes from my daily training," he says. "I really see improvements



on a daily basis and it's easy for me to stay focused."

O'Brien says he sees himself becoming "better and better every day," which makes him work harder. To demonstrate this philosophy, he quotes another champion, Milt Campbell, who won the 1956 Olympic gold medal in the decathlon.

"Good, better, best. Never let it rest, until the good gets better and the better gets best."

O'Brien is striving to be at his "best" in Atlanta, where he hopes to imitate Campbell's feat.

"I like to think about running at the Olympics in 1996," he says. "I ask myself, 'What am I going to do when I cross the finish line of the 1,500 and I've just won the gold medal?' That's what keeps me going."
